Fellowships

Applicants who intend to study full-time may apply for *Scholarships*, which cover **all tuition costs**, and *Graduate Assistantships*, which provide an annual stipend ranging from **\$10,000 to \$15,000** in exchange for 15 hours of service per week when the university is in session. Truly exceptional applicants are exempted from the service requirement. Special *Arrupe Fellowships* exist for candidates who wish to pursue careers with private international relief and development organizations.

Review Process

Completed applications, including three letters of recommendation, general aptitude scores on the Graduate Record Examination (GRE) and the transcripts of previous undergraduate and graduate course work, must be submitted to Fordham's Graduate Admissions Office by **January 15**. International students must also submit their TOEFL test scores.





AMUN DELEGATION LOTTERY



*A lottery for country assignments to the
2002 AMUN Conference will be held on Monday, 19 November 2001.*

Lottery applications are due before 11:00 a.m. on Monday, 19 November 2001. A non-refundable \$50 deposit is required for each country at the time of application and will be applied toward the school's 2002 fees. All schools which enter the lottery will be randomly selected for first choice of country assignments. Schools which register for more than one delegation will be placed in the initial lottery for one delegation, and will be assigned additional delegations following the initial lottery.

FEE DISCOUNT FOR ALL LOTTERY PARTICIPANTS!

Any school which registers through the lottery will receive a \$5.00 PER DELEGATE DISCOUNT on all delegate fees for the 2002 AMUN Conference. Thus if you bring 4 students or 40, AMUN will take \$5.00 off the regular delegate fees for each delegate attending. Even if you add additional delegations at a later date, the \$5/delegate discount will still apply.







The wheel has already been invented

Two brilliant strategies revisited

If all the nations of the earth dedicated themselves to right human relations based on sharing and justice, how long would it be before peace was established throughout the world? How would one begin to develop such a global strategy?

- ◆ In 1977, former West German Chancellor Willy Brandt brought together a panel of international leaders to examine the world economy and the problems plaguing the developing nations. In 1980, their findings were published in ***North-South: A Program for Survival*** (MIT Press).
- ◆ **This extraordinary 'state of the world' report** concluded with specific recommendations in the areas of: world hunger, poverty, aid, debt, environment, trade, money and finance, and global coordination. It further predicted the inevitable consequences if the developed world failed to take large-scale, immediate action to ameliorate the growing problems in the developing world — home to 80% of the world's people. Sadly, most of the commission's recommendations were never implemented and its predictions came to pass. Nevertheless, it **remains the most viable blueprint for restructuring our world along more just and compassionate lines.***
- ◆ Years before the Brandt Commission, another inspired world leader proposed a strategy that saved a continent and preserved a fragile peace. Today, wise voices from the Vatican to the World Bank are calling for **a new, worldwide Marshall Plan-type program to aid the developing world.**
- ◆ It is estimated that the annual cost of providing the basic necessities of life — nutrition and health care, primary education, sanitation and safe drinking water, and family planning services — throughout the developing world **would cost around \$40 billion a year.** Compare this to what we are spending today for a global 'war on terrorism' that will only exacerbate the underlying issues.
- ◆ To solve the most pressing problems of the world — and eliminate the *underlying causes* of terrorism and war — **we do not need to reinvent the wheel.** We must simply recognize that there can be no true freedom and security for *anyone* until there is justice for *everyone*. **The solutions are easily within our grasp.**
- ◆ **To help us implement the needed changes, a group of great spiritual teachers is now emerging into the everyday world.** At the head of this group is the World Teacher, Maitreya, who will inspire us to create a new civilization based on sharing, social and economic justice, and international cooperation. He will also reveal to us our true nature as spiritual beings. **Listen for their wise counsel in the weeks and months ahead.**
