THE ECONOMIC AND SOCIAL COUNCIL

- 1 Alarmed by the dire problems faced by African nations today and the need to address these issues in a timely manner,
- 3 *Cognizant* of the fact that fourteen of the twenty-one Sub-Saharan nations of which we have enrollment data are far behind the target or have deteriorating enrollments,
- Noting with deep concern that numerous schools in Africa have been forced to close because of the consequences of HIV/AIDS,
- 7 Recognizing the strides made by the African Union and NEPAD in many areas,
- 8 Fully believing that education must be addressed to ameliorate these problems,
- 9 Aware of the responsibility of the United Nations to advance the human condition,
- 10 1. Requests additional funding from NGO's and developed states to improve education on the African continent as a whole;
- 2. Recommends the creation of an overseeing committee, which would address the genuine problems plaguing the continent, ensuring accountability, respect sovereignty, and supervise the proper use and destination of funds, made up of NGO's, donor nations, and African nations which would work in equal influence to investigate on a case by basis how to improve educational infrastructure in African countries;
- 17 3. *Encourages* this overseeing committee to address the building of more schools and the education of educators across the continent, to give all children an opportunity to receive an education, regardless of gender, class, race, region, or religion;

- 4. Targets health education, while keeping in mind cultural sensitivity, specifically to give
 African citizens the proper knowledge to protect themselves from epidemic diseases like
 HIV/AIDS and other diseases that have so plagued the continent including malaria,
 cholera since these diseases are so easily preventable with proper education;
 - 5. *Emphasizes* the role of primary education in improving literacy rates across Africa;
 - 6. Further recommends vocational education in an effort to prepare African students for the workplace by giving them job skills in the areas of technology, medicine, and agriculture, which would lay the infrastructure of social development and a positive economy in the future.
