

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Michael Byers



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AMUN DELEGATION LOTTERY



A lottery for country assignments to the 2003 AMUN Conference will be held on Monday, 25 November 2002.

Lottery applications are due before 11:00 a.m. on Monday, 25 November 2002. A non-refundable \$50 deposit is required for each country at the time of application and will be applied toward the school's 2003 fees. All schools which enter the lottery will be randomly selected for first choice of country assignments. Schools which register for more than one delegation will be placed in the initial lottery for one delegation, and will be assigned additional delegations following the initial lottery.

Fee Discount For All Lottery Participants!

Any school which registers through the lottery will receive a \$5.00 PER DELEGATE DISCOUNT on all delegate fees for the 2003 AMUN Conference. Thus if you bring 4 students or 40, AMUN will take \$5.00 off the regular delegate fees for each delegate attending. Even if you add additional delegations at a later date, the \$5/delegate discount will still apply.

The Legend and the Legacy

During the 2003-2004 academic year, a year-long 100th anniversary program will celebrate the legacy of Dr. Ralph J. Bunche, a great American and a great international civil servant.

From humble beginnings as a young black man in America, he achieved many firsts in a racially hostile social environment. He fashioned several path-breaking careers, in academia, as a civil rights leader and as a dedicated civil servant in both the United States government and the United Nations. He was to be the first African-American, or person of color of any origin to be awarded the Nobel Prize for Peace.

The Centenary Commemoration Committee wishes to "translate the legend, which is an instrument for a better future for humanity". It has identified themes that can serve as a focus of an activity: The Scholar-Activist; Civil Rights and Race: An American Dilemma Revisited; The Integrity of Public Service, International and National; Self-Determination and Decolonization; Mediation, Negotiation and Peacekeeping; A New Generation Looks at Ralph J. Bunche: Africa; The Arab-Israeli Conflict The United States and Africa.

Human Rights Scholarships for Summer 2003

The Patrick Stewart Human Rights Scholarship offers students a unique opportunity to gain practical experience in the field of human rights. Scholarships are awarded to promising young human rights activists to complete summer internships or other creative human rights projects in the U.S. or abroad. Approximately 20 awards are made annually for projects that typically last from 6 weeks to 4 months and range from \$300 to \$1,800 to be used for travel, lodging, materials, etc.

How to Apply

Propose a specific project or internship that addresses a human rights issue that you have experience or interest in. You can apply for an independent project or an internship with a local, national, or international human rights organization. Most scholarships are awarded for projects that represent a first-time, hands-on experience and combine the development of activist skills with training or research.

Who Can Apply

The scholarship is open to students attending U.S. schools and to U.S. citizens who are studying abroad.

The MA Curriculum

The MA in International Political Economy and Development (IPED) is a 12-course (3-semester) program designed to train students for international professional careers in business, government, or non-profit agencies.

Our curriculum offers a rigorous foundation in economic, political, social, & quantitative analysis, and an advanced interdisciplinary study of global economic relations and international development issues. Students may use their electives to specialize in: Comparative & International Politics; Development Studies; Emerging Markets & Country Risk Analysis; International Business & Finance; and International & Development Economics.

Fellowships

Applicants who intend to study full-time may apply for *Scholarships*, which cover **all tuition costs**, and *Graduate Assistantships*, which provide an annual stipend ranging from \$10,000 to \$15,000 in exchange for 15 hours of service per week when the university is in session. Truly exceptional applicants are exempted from the service requirement. Special *Murray Fellowships* exist for candidates who wish to pursue careers analyzing international commercial and financial markets. We also offer special *Arrupe Fellowships* for candidates who wish to pursue careers with private international relief and development organizations.

Review Process

Completed applications, including three letters of recommendation, general aptitude scores on the Graduate Record Examination (GRE) and the transcripts of previous undergraduate and graduate course work, must be submitted to Fordham's Graduate Admissions Office by **January 15**. International students must also submit their TOEFL test scores.


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
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HYATT REGENCY CHICAGO CONFERENCE CENTER MAPS

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
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
