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Recognizing the importance of human development for increasing sustainable development and increased economic development, which helps states struggling to create a stable economic environment with a more broadly trained and educated work force,

Affirming the United Nations Millennium Development Goal that will aim to achieve universal primary education for all states by 2015, as well as the goal to develop a global partnership amongst all states to create the environment for development for all states,

Noting with approval the commitment of developed states to help support developing states with trade, aid, investment, and debt relief as decided at the International Conference on Financing and Development held in Monterrey, Mexico in March of 2002,

Realizing that state governments are responsible for creating human development programs when many are still trying to manage debt and economic difficulties, that this requires the support of developed states and the private sector to make available the technology needed to provide increased education to further human development,

- 1. *Requests* all states to fulfill the agreement made at the International Conference on Financing and Developing in March of 2002;
- 2. *Encourages* the United Nations to urge support from the private sector with providing technology and development assistance to states;
- 3. Asking the United Nations, appropriate regional subdivisions, organizations, and national governments to set standards which can be used to determine the states that will receive technological assistance and how that assistance will be used to ensure access to it by people at all levels of social and economic development;

- 4. *Recommends* that the UN Educational, Scientific, and Cultural Organization be utilized to increase the number of states that have access to information and communication technology as set forth in the Dakar Framework for Action, which will help achieve the Education for All goals;
- 5. *Requests* support from the United Nations agencies, including UNESCO, to further structure SILP programs in partnerships with companies, institutions of higher education, federal, state, and city governments in developing countries;
- 6. *Recommends* that Angola, East Timor, Mozambique, São Tomé, Principe, Cape Verde, and Guatemala who have the structural beginnings of SILP programs, be used as pilot countries to determine the effectiveness of this program in other countries.
