SUBJECT OF RESOLUTION: High-Level Segment: Promoting and Integration Approach to

Rural Development in Developing Countries for Poverty

Education and Sustainable Development

Recognizing that education is essential to economic growth,

Reaffirming our commitment to Millennium Development Goals,

Acknowledging that Technical Education is a major component in achieving the Millennium Development Goals,

Recognizing the importance of education - particularly amongst women and especially in rural areas - as it relates to poverty eradication, economic growth, rural development, and sustainable development,

- 1. *Stresses* the importance of the implementation of vocational education programs overseen by the United Nations, which would focus on;
- (a) Hands on training, provided by volunteers from more highly developed nations as well as by the national government;
- (b) Development of Farmer Field Schools with the aid of IFAD and FAO in a similar pattern as those seen in developing Asian countries;
- (c) Developing micro loan programs for small enterprise development based on one or a combination of the following existing micro economic models: Grameen Model, Group Model, Credit Union Model, and Village Banking Model;
 - (d) Diversification of alternative methods to slash and burn and extraction technique;
- 2. Requests that the Commission on Sustainable Development establish guidelines outlining preferable agricultural techniques and strategies for developing countries on a regional basis, including but not limited to;
- (a) Diversification of alternative methods to slash and burn/extraction; Livelihoods, such as skilled work, fishing, and environmentally sustainable agriculture techniques;

36 37	(b) Introducing environmentally friendly sustaining methods such as drip irrigation and hydroponics;
38 39 40	(c) Implementing methods to aid with problems such as desertification and lack of fresh water;
