SUBJECT OF RESOLUTION:

Follow-Up to the Outcome of the Twenty-Sixth Special Session: Implementation of the Declaration of Commitment on HIV/AIDS

The General Assembly

Recognizing that the implementation of the Declaration of Commitment on the Human Immunodeficiency Virus/Acquired Immunodeficiency Syndrome (HIV/AIDS) and the fulfillment of the targets set therein are integrally linked to the attainment of the development goals set out in the United Nations Millennium Declaration,

Recalling its resolution S-26/2 of 27 June 2001, entitled "Declaration of Commitment on HIV/AIDS", in which it decided to devote sufficient time and at least one full day of the annual session of the General Assembly to review and debate a report of the Secretary-General,

Cognizant that 2003 represented the first year that the time-bound commitments set out in the Declaration of Commitment are due to be met, and that the other targets are to be met by 2005 and 2010,

Mindful of the Brussels Programme of Action for the Least Developed Countries for the Decade 2001-2010, the Doha Ministerial Declaration, the Monterrey Consensus of the International Conference on Financing for Development, and the Johannesburg Plan of Implementation of the World Summit on Sustainable Development,

Declaring that high risk populations vary from region to region, we are agreed that said populations are ones which are conducive to the spread of HIV/AIDS,

Emphasizing the shared responsibility of member states to 'manage the worldwide economic and social development' outlined within the Millennium Declaration,

Deeply disturbed that over the last two decades, AIDS is believed to have affected 58 million people and claimed about 22 million lives,

Fully aware that if no real action is taken to prevent and reverse the increase and effects of HIV/AIDS, numerous peoples and their countries will be devastated both economically and socially,

33 34 35	<i>Taking into account</i> the critical role of society at all levels in the response to HIV/AIDS, in particular to people living with HIV/AIDS,
36 37	<i>Reaffirming</i> Article 25 para. 2 of the Declaration of Human Rights statement, 'Everyone has the right to a standard of living adequate for the health and well-being of himself and his family',
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39 40	Recognizing that the problem of HIV/AIDS occurs differently in separate regions,
41 42	Believing that current funding is significant but the money is being inadequately used,
43 44	<i>Deeply concerned</i> that HIV/AIDS causes a huge strain on member states' economies, labor force, health care systems, social systems and basic infrastructure,
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46 47	Understanding that each country has its own values with the need for preservation of cultural values on a regional basis, and that each region has its own and different problems concerning

49 50 51 52	1. <i>Emphasizes</i> continued work and support for the 3 by 5 Initiative and calls for its extension until the year 2015;
52 53 54 55	2. <i>Calls for</i> regional councils to be formed to oversee funding of HIV/AIDS prevention, treatment and research which shall be named the Regional Plan for HIV/AIDS:
55 56 57 58	(a) Each council shall be made up of equal representation from each member state in a particular region
59 60	(b) Recognizing the need to maintain transparency, the council shall include representation from the UNDP, and submit an annual report to the General Assembly
61 62 63	(c) Recommends the implementation of a Three-Step Educational Plan of awareness, prevention, and treatment to include:
64 65	(i) Awareness:
66 67 68	a. United Nations training for a limited number of counselors from each region who can convey the information back to their region.
69 70 71	b. Culturally-sensitive programs to teach awareness, preventive measures, and proper treatment methods
72 73 74	c. Educational programs to teach awareness to high-risk populations, taking into account all methods of HIV/AIDS transmission
75 76 77 78	d. Emphasis on HIV/AIDS education that reinforces the values of the individual member nations, their cultural and religious beliefs

80 81 82	a. Preventive education for high-risk populations in all local languages
82 83 84	b. Education on preventive measures for workers in high-risk occupations

85 86	c. Distribution of prophylactics in all areas where deemed culturally acceptable
86 87	d. The creation of needle and syringe exchange programs where deemed necessary
88 89	(iii) Treatment:
90 91 92	a. Training of local public and private medical practitioners on the proper treatment and care of individuals infected with HIV/AIDS
93	of individuals infected with HTV/AIDS
94 95	b. Counseling programs to help individuals affected with HIV/AIDS and their families
96 97	c. Supports the establishment of national exchange programs of medical personnel in order to trade knowledge, information, techniques, and training between the nations
98 99 100	d. Encourages the funding of future research into vaccinations for a cure to the HIV/AIDS virus
101 102 103 104	3. <i>Expresses</i> its hope that all nations will strive to address issues which prevent those living with HIV/AIDS from disclosing this fact or prevent individuals from seeking testing of HIV/AIDS;
105 106 107	4. <i>Requests</i> that funding for the Regional Plan for HIV/AIDS be organized through the Joint United Nations Programme on HIV/AIDS (UNAIDS);
108 109 110	5. <i>Calls upon</i> the help of non-governmental organizations, private companies and philanthropists to assist in funding this program;
111 112 113	6. <i>Further calls upon</i> nations who have pledged funding for the Declaration of Commitment on HIV/AIDS to fulfill their pledges;
114 115 116 117	7. <i>Calls</i> for a broad international study done by UNAIDS to find the links between AIDS and armed conflict, poverty, lack of educational opportunity, and natural disasters;
117 118 119 120	8. <i>Reaffirms</i> the goal that the solution should be mindful and considerate of the varied viewpoints of the nations of the world;
120 121 122 123	9. <i>Requests</i> the Secretary-General to streamline the efforts of all the HIV/AIDS programs within the United Nations and reevaluate their cost-efficiency to devote excess funds towards this program.
