SUBJECT OF RESOLUTION: The Situation in Bosnia-Herzegovina

The Historical Security Council

Deeply concerned with the recent conflict in Bosnia-Herzegovina,

Reaffirming resolutions 824 of 6 May 1993, 820 of 17 April 1993, 819 of 16 April 1993, 816 of 31 March 1993, 808 of 22 February 1993, 807 of 19 February 1993 and other subsequent resolutions pertaining to concerns of international peace and security in Bosnia and Croatia,

Considering Chapter VII of the United Nations Charter,

Alarmed by the continuing armed hostilities by Bosnian Serb paramilitary units against several towns in the Republic of Bosnia-Herzegovina, especially those designated as safe zones by Resolution 824 (1993) and determined to ensure peace and stability throughout the country,

Taking into consideration the urgent humanitarian needs faced by several towns in the Republic of Bosnia-Herzegovina that have been exacerbated by the constant influx of displaced persons, in particular, the sick and wounded,

Alarmed by the plight of innocent victims of the conflict in the Republic of Bosnia-Herzegovina,

Emphasizing that all appropriate measures should be undertaken to achieve a peaceful settlement of the conflict in the Republic of Bosnia-Herzegovina as provided for in the Vance Owen Peace Plan,

*Convinced* that the situation in Bosnia-Herzegovina continues to threaten international peace and security,

Deploring the failure of some parties to cooperate fully with the United Nations Protection Force (UNPROFOR) in the implementation of the provisions of the flight ban as enumerated in Resolution 781 (1992),

Recalling the provisions of Resolution 815 (1993) on the mandate of UNPROFOR,

Further recalling operative clause 4 of Resolution 776 (1992),

Reaffirming the role of the newly established international tribunal for the prosecution of persons responsible for the above mentioned human rights violations,

Further reaffirming, per Resolution 816 (1993), the ability of Member States to act individually or through regional arrangements to take, under the coordination with the Secretary-General and collaboration with UNPROFOR and under the authority of the Security Council, all necessary measures to ensure compliance with the ban on flights not exempted in Resolution 781 in Bosnian airspace, provided that such measures are proportional to the specific circumstances and the nature of the flights,

Acting under the provisions of Chapter VII,

- 1. *Strongly condemns* the ongoing and egregious violations of human rights in Bosnia-Herzegovina;
- 2. *Demands* that all parties concerned cease hostilities against the demilitarized zones and the civilians and humanitarian workers within these zones;
  - 3. Condemns attacks on UNPROFOR and other UN personnel in the region;
- 4. *Demands* that all parties must permit UN personnel free and unimpeded access to safe areas, and other areas of humanitarian concern;
- 5. Authorizes UNPROFOR personnel to take all necessary measures to defend themselves and safe areas, including the use of force;
- 6. Also authorizes the extension of the mandate of UNPROFOR and other UN personnel in the area, subject to review by the Council at least every three months;
- 7. Requests that the Secretary-General make a report to the Security Council with great speed with recommendations regarding improving the logistical and operational needs of UNPROFOR;
- 8. *Strongly encourages* that Member States contribute troops to increase the current UNPROFOR personnel in order to carry out its mandate, to fully secure the borders of established safe zones, and to ensure the integrity of the arms embargo as outlined in Resolution 713 (1992);
- 9. Requests the Secretary-General to make a report of the situation within sixty days. If significant progress towards a negotiated peace and an increase in the protection of human rights is not affirmed by this report this body will consider supporting proactive military action;
  - 10. Decides to remain actively seized of the matter.
