I know each of you is up to the task that lies before you and I hope you find the process and the experience, not just the end result, rewarding.




WHAT WILL AMUN DISCUSS NEXT YEAR?

International coverage in Brazil had moments of great importance, mostly during the years of military dictatorship, when international reports were used to fill the empty spaces created by the censorship. During the 90s, even the biggest media corporations had reduced the number of journalists working abroad. Now, there is a significant increase in the number of offices in other countries, requiring a closer observation of how international matters are brought up.

Attending AMUN will also be a great opportunity for me to observe the role of developing countries in international politics, specifically Latin America.


YEAR OF TERROR

The Historic Security Council retraces 1972

Greetings distinguished representatives. Today is January 11, 1973. The Secretary-General has requested that you receive a briefing on the standing of United Nations affairs over the last year, as we enter the New Year.



This the October 25, 1971 passage agreement established the of General Assembly resolution 2758 recognizing the People's Republic as the sole representative of the Chinese people. Subsequently Japan normalized relations with the People's Republic of China while breaking relations with the Republic of China on September 29, 1972. However, a threatening situation has developed between the People's Republic of China and the USSR. Following the armed clashes between the two states over Zhenbao (also known as Demonskiy) Island known as Damanskiy) Island in 1969, both sides increased troop levels on their common border, increasing the amount to over 3 million.

In Asia – The situation in Indochina continues to appear dire. The bombings of Hanoi and Haiphong from December 18-29, 1972 by the United States, ordered by American President Richard Nixon, have come to a class. Currently possible. to a close. Currently negotiations continue in Paris, led by American National Security Advisor Henry Kissinger and North Vietnamese negotiator Le Duc Tho with a potential agreement in sight.



Home Government, located in the Mississippi Room on the Meeting Room Level, can help. As the Conference's substantive information center, Home Government can assist in providing answers to questions that arise during conference. By submitting an information request, representatives can ask one of our experienced researchers to locate documents to help guide policy discussions.

Another option is to request a briefing, a one-on-one discussion with a Home Government staff member to more fully explore a complicated topic. Home Government can also provide briefings for your entire committee to clarify an issue, or can provide role players for unrepresented countries, non-governmental organizations, and parties to the dispute. For more information on role players, please ask your dais staff or simulation director.

Home Government will open 15 minutes before sessions begin and will remain open 15 minutes after sessions close.
