Children

Affirming A/RES/58/157 which calls for "all States to give support and rehabilitation to children and their families affected by HIV/AIDS and to involve children and their caregivers, as well as the private sector, to ensure the effective prevention of HIV infections through correct information and access to voluntary and confidential care, treatment and testing, including pharmaceutical products and medical technologies, affordable to all, giving due importance to the prevention of mother-to-child transmission of the virus,"

*Encouraging* Member States to give this resolution concrete implementation to help solve the HIV/ AIDS pandemic,

Seriously noting that measures have already been taken regarding HIV/ AIDS and that more needs to be done in specific ways in order to achieve this goal,

 Recognizing educating world peoples on issues, including owning land, businesses, and increasing political and social efficacy, is important to all Member States to helping stop the social reasons for HIV/ AIDS amongst the worlds children, furthermore, creating a decrease in promiscuity and economic dependence on having many partners is key to the eradication of HIV/ AIDS,

Concerned that over 15 million children worldwide, 12 million of whom are from sub-Saharan Africa, have lost both parents due to AIDS, and that over fifty percent of children orphaned from AIDS are between 10 and 14 years old and many take responsibility for raising younger siblings,

1. Promotes the use of NGOs in order to foster and implement exposure to the world public about HIV/ AIDS and reducing the use of non safe-sex practices including promiscuity; moreover, that using NGOs is an important step in strengthening cultures from within against HIV/ AIDS and therefore make the world safer for children;

2. *Desires* an increase in education in under developed countries to educate

on the problem of HIV/ AIDS in primary and secondary education, specifically in the areas of HIV/ AIDS prevention in ways that cater to the individual group that is being educated;

3. *Encourages* Member States to reduce primary school fees;

4. *Encourages* Member States to streamline adoption procedures for international adoptions to proceed more rapidly;

5. Calls for all Member States to increase health spending and implementation in fighting HIV/ AIDS, especially as it applies to intravenous drug use and maternal transmission;

6. *Urges* all Member States to join hands and help to fight global HIV/ AIDS and create a global "culture of peace" through increased education, health funding, and implementation for the children and parents of the world.
