SUBJECT OF RESOLUTION: The Illicit Trade in Small Arms and Light Weapons in All its Aspects SUBMITTED TO: The First Committee SUBMITTED BY: Mexico, Honduras, Guatemala, Benin, Bolivia, Dominican Republic, Argentina, Vietnam, Haiti, Holy See The First Committee Guided by the 2001 summit of the United Nations Conference to Review Progress Made in the Implementation of the Programme of Action to Prevent, Combat, and Eradicate the Illicit Trade in Small Arms and Light Weapons has made a positive step toward aiding this growing problem, Cognizant that the illicit trade of small arms hinders the development of developing nations, Further recognizing that illicit small arms stifle national security in developed nations and obstructs their ability to fight against illicit drug trafficking and terrorism, Acknowledging that illicit trade hinders the development of developing nations and threatens global security, Affirming the UN's 1977 adoption of a definition of a illicit small arm or light weapon, including; handguns, rifles, carbines, submachine guns, heavy machine guns, assault rifles, hand-held/under-barrel/mounted grenade launchers, portable anti aircraft and anti-tank weapons, recoilless rifles, portable missile and rocket systems, landmines, and mortars of calibers less than one hundred millimeters. Recognizes the efforts from Member States to address the problems caused by illicit small arms and their actions taken to limit the illicit trade and manufacturing of small arms,

Welcomes efforts from all Member States, including weapons producing countries

Knowing that illicit small arms cause violence, domestic crime, militant rebel

groups, child soldiers, illicit drug trafficking, and hinder progress in the democratic

processes in developing countries and threatens the security of the developed nations

to curtail the illicit trade of small arms and light weapons and ammunitions,

Citing that illicit small arms require little skill to be operated and therefore promote the use of child soldiers,

1. Strongly requests stricter regulation by Member States of stamping registration numbers on all future illicit small arms and light weapons by all the manufacturers, and that the stamps include: trademark, caliber, model, registration number, country of origin, and destination country of the arms;

2. Further declares stricter regulation by Member States of stamping the name of manufacturer, lot number, and caliber on small arms and light weapons ammunition;

3. *Recommends* that Member States keep records of trade and transfer of small arms, light weapons, and ammunitions;

4. *Promotes* member nations to designate or establish a method within their own government with the mission of overseeing the manufacturing, importing, exporting, buying, and selling of small arms, light weapons, and ammunition;

 5. Expects that at the 2006 United Nations Conference to Review Progress Made in the Implementation of the Programme of Action to Prevent, Combat, and Eradicate the Illicit Trade in Small arms and Light Weapons member nations amend the Programme of Action to include mandatory annual reports on small arms, light weapons, and ammunition caches;

6. *Works* to ensure uniformity in the placement of the identification marks stamped on the small arms, light weapons, and ammunitions;

7. *Encourages* the United Nations Conference to Review Progress Made in the Implementation of the Programme of Action to Prevent, Combat, and Eradicate the Illicit Trade in Small arms and Light Weapon to meet annually to report on the issues of manufacturing, trade, and transfer of small arms, light weapons, and ammunition;

8. *Recommends* that member states to submit within five-years a record of their current small arms, light weapons stockpiles according to registration number;

9. *Requests* that member nations serialize, register, and catalog currently unregistered small illicit arms, light weapons, and ammunitions stockpiles.
