3. *Calls upon* member states and the UNHCR to work together in order to guarantee the safety and ongoing protection of refugees, including post-return monitoring and safe passage to a third country;

4. *Recommends* the UNHCR create multilateral agreements with commitments to address the protection and needs of refugee groups including, but not limited to, comprehensive plans of action;

5. Stresses the importance of broadening the strategic use of resettlement in order to make resettlement a viable option for more refugees, including those in protracted refugee situations, and in situations where repatriation is not an option;

6. *Discourages* of the use of unilateral forced repatriation, also called refoulement, to move refugees back to areas where they will again face persecution.
