Affirming the legitimate sovereign right of all states to make use of chemical, biological, and nuclear technology for peaceful means,

 Observing that a necessary component to prevent terrorists from acquiring weapons of mass destruction is greater regulation and transparency of corporations that transfer components which may be used in the production of weapons of mass destruction,

1. *Encourages* the unequivocal elimination of all nuclear, biological, and chemical weapons as such policies stands as the most effective means to prevent terrorists from acquiring weapons of mass destruction;

 2. Stresses the urgency and importance of universal, unconditional ratification and adherence to multilateral agreements that have been negotiated on these topics, including the Biological Weapons Convention, Chemical Weapons Convention, Comprehensive Nuclear Test Ban Treaty, and the Nuclear Non Proliferation Treaty;

4. *Calls* upon member states to sign and ratify the International Convention for the Suppression of Acts of Nuclear Terrorism;

5. *Reminds* states that efforts to curb and eliminate weapons of mass destruction should not encroach on the sovereign right of all states to exploit chemical, biological, and nuclear technologies for peaceful uses;

6. *Urges* the strengthening of security measures to guard against the possibility of theft of nuclear, chemical and biological weapons materials, technology or intelligence by non state actors from production and storage facilities;

7. *Requests* the second committee to consider mobilizing funds and technology to assist states to strengthen such measures as they are crucial to international security and development;

 8. *Encourages* states in pursuit of peaceful nuclear technology to work under the auspices of the IAEA, to enhance the transparency of their nuclear endeavors and to improve the effectiveness of safeguards, and report concerns and recommendations to the First Committee;

9. Welcomes the expansion of nuclear weapons free zones, and requests that states take immediate action to support and recognize the need for nuclear weapons free zones as an effective means to prevent terrorists from acquiring WMD;

10. *Encourages* states to form regional organizations to supervise the effectivness of states' policies to combat terrorism and applaudes those already formed, such as the RES:175

Inter-American Convention Against Terrorism;

11. *Affirms* that measures to prevent terrorists from acquiring WMD must also address the underlying causes that compel groups to such desperate violent measures and must therefore reduce poverty and global inequalities.
