1 2	<i>Recalling</i> the work of the ILC concerning the responsibility of States for internationally wrongful acts as a landmark text that propelled the development and the
3	complex set of arrangements developed between States,
4 5	Noting with satisfaction the draft articles on responsibility of States for
6	internationally wrongful acts submitted to the General Assembly by the ILC,
7	internationally wrongtat acts buchniced to all Ceneral Libbennory by the Libb,
8	Noting wrongful acts include but are not limited to the commission of serious
9	violations of international humanitarian law,
10	
11 12	Bearing in mind Chapter I, Article 2, which states that an international wrongful
12	act pertains to an action or omission by a State,
14	<i>Recalling</i> S/Res/1624, which calls upon States to adopt measures to prohibit acts
15	of terrorism and to prevent such conduct that incites such acts as well as to strengthen
16	their international borders,
17	
18	<i>Recognizing</i> the current dichotomy between acts committed by individual(s) and
19 20	States,
20	Keeping in mind that prosecution of individuals who commit wrongful acts is
22	within the purview of the ICC and those committed by States is within the purview of the
23	ICJ,
24	
25	Fully recognizing the importance of national sovereignty,
26	
27 28	Seeking to further strengthen aforementioned draft articles,
28 29	1. Encourages States to ratify the aforementioned draft articles, such that the
30	General Assembly and Security Council can consider entering the articles into the United
	RES:130

31 32	Nations Charter (and approval of the Declaration of Human Rights);
33	2. Affirms the need for the body to consider the repercussions that occur when an interaction allow when a full oct is committed.
34 35	internationally wrongful act is committed;
36	3. Expresses its hope for States to consider their current laws pertaining to the
37	acquisition of weapons, materials and funds that may enable citizens to commit wrongful
38	acts;

40	4. <i>Realizes</i> the need for Member States to entrust the ICJ including addressing the
41 42	issues of reparations, consequences, etc. without bias;
43	(a) the length of reparations;
44	(b) the amount of reparations;
45	(c) the reversibility of reparations;
46	
47	5. Urges States to create measures that will further deter citizens from
48	committing wrongful acts, and in so doing protect themselves from the attribution of
49	responsibility;

51	6. <i>Recommends</i> that the International Law Commission consider a criterion of
52	partial responsibility of state actors and non-state actors in committing intentional
53	wrongful acts and advise this committee and its next meeting.
