Senator Krueger Discusses Importance of

"Bodies floating in rivers are not newsworthy," the reporter's voice on the other end of the phone line was saying to Senator Robert Krueger. While serving as a United States ambassador to Burundi, Krueger had become concerned about the escalating genocide. "The international press was the strongest tool I had," Krueger explained, "to try and prevent the slaughter. But the reporter, who was part of an important news channel, told me people are tired of seeing bodies floating in the rivers. He said, 'they're not very interested in stuff like that."" Yet Krueger kept demanding the truth be heard.

Krueger was appointed as a United States ambassador under President

Carter. He was ambassador to Mexico, Burundi, and eventually Botswana. While in Burundi, Krueger experienced first-hand the challenges confronting a nation trying and failing to hold democratic elections. The military staged a coup, abducted the President and half his cabinet, killing them "and buried the bodies in a mass grave... Then they expected the country to go on as before," Krueger said. It'd be like someone shooting the President on the steps of the capital. The shootings encouraged internal rifts between the Hutus and the militarized Tutsis, which then led to massive slaughter. According to Krueger, there were 100 deaths each day. The world responded by feigning ignorance.

In the aftermath of the slaughter,

Krueger continues to appeal to the United Nations for the creation of a Truth and Reconciliation Committee (TRC) for Burundi, a safe space in which both those who have been hurt can address their grievances and those who have caused hurt can surrender their guilt. South Africa and Rwanda, Krueger said, are perfect examples of how a TRC can be successful. "There's nothing more [important] than the truth, reconciliation, and forgiveness for those living in genocide," Krueger continued, "These committees help create a society in which it's more important to let the dead bury the dead than to carry the past into the future. "Ultimately," Krueger said, "we need to realize we're all part of the larger fabric of mankind."
