SUBJECT OF RESOLUTION: Comprehensive Review of Peacekeeping Operations in all Their Aspects SUBMITTED TO: The Fourth Committee SUBMITTED BY: Mauritania, Cameroon, Zimbabwe, Niger, Angola, Madagascar, Peru, Ecuador, Colombia, China, Thailand, Kazakhstan The Fourth Committee Guided by A/Res/476 19 November 2007, Mindful of the continuous necessity of preserving the efficiency and strengthening the effectiveness of the work of the Special Committee, Affirming that the efforts of the United Nations in the peaceful settlement of disputes, including through its peacekeeping operations, are indispensable, Agreeing with the Coalition for the International Criminal Court, strongly supporting the integrity of the Rome Statute and urging that respective peacekeeping troops are held accountable for actions of misconduct, Deeply concerned by recent atrocities of misconduct and sexual exploitation committed by many United Nations Peacekeeping forces in places such as Congo, Burundi, Haiti, Liberia, Kosovo, Côte d'Ivoire, Sierra Leone, and many others nations recognizes A/RES/ 60/289 (2006) of 18 September 2006 and report of he Secretary General A/60/40, *Notes* that the conduct and discipline units in the Department of Peacekeeping Operations are vital to the integrity of not only the United Nations as a whole, but also the implementation of the recommendations of the Special Committee on Peacekeeping Operations A/55/977, Convinced of the need for the United Nations to continue to improve its

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Recognizes the United Nations will not be able to effectively concentrate on new missions, unless an exit strategy for older missions is in place,

capabilities in the field of peacekeeping and to enhance the effective and efficient

76	(d) Consideration of regional perspective when the Security Council sends
77	a peacekeeping force into any area of conflict via a regional committee
78	which will provide insight and guidance for the peacekeeping force

10. Further recommends that extraction of peacekeeping troops should be executed in a gradual, well planned manner;

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11. Calls upon the international cor

11. Calls upon the international community for immediate improvement and development of all peacekeeping troops and operations as outlined in GA/SPD/178 by expanding already existing regional and global training facilities, continuing to recall the right of host nations to decide whether international or regional peacekeepers are appropriate;

12. *Recommends* that no person should be immune from the prosecution for genocide, sexual misconduct, crimes against humanity or war crimes, as stipulated by Article 27 of the Rome Statute and requests that the ICC, having the jurisdiction not to prosecute but to provide recommendations continue to review cases of misconduct to respective member nations accordingly and report such recommendations to the General Assembly;

13. *Encourages* the promotion of a way to efficiently allow member nations involved to submit any grievances in relation to abuse or other negative implications of a peace keeping operation in order to promote the mandate of the peacekeeping operation;

- 14. Moves to integrate peacekeeping as a role of both regional and international organizations;
- 15. *Welcomes* the establishment of World Conference on Peacekeeping Operations (WCPO), a summit to further explore vital solutions to peacekeeping operations throughout the international community:
 - (a) The first world submit to be held in Venezuela at a date to be determined:
 - (b) WCPO will be held every two years among willing member states.
