1 2 3	<i>Recognizing</i> the importance of industrial development cooperation in promoting global trade and economic interdependence, integration,
3 4 5	<i>Further recognizing</i> the intrinsic link between increased industrial development and global and regional security through the stability offered by economic growth,
6	and global and regional security through the stability offered by economic growth,
7	Noting with regret the difficulties faced by many Member Nations that are unable
8	to attain the Millennium Development Goals by 2015,
9	to attain the Winterintant Development Gould by 2015,
10	Considering that the asymmetry of global urban and rural development hinders
11	efforts to integrate rural regions in member states across the world and noting its unique
12	link to the difficulties in attaining these Millennium Development Goals,
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14	Noting with satisfaction the increasingly apparent developmental benefits of
15	expanded trade and investments in health-care and educational capacities,
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17	Believing that micro-credit and micro-financing offer a unique opportunity to
18	target groups specified by the Millennium Development Goals,
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20	Convinced of the benefits of trade between emerging markets, greater South-South
21	cooperation and the progress made by the programs of UNIDO,
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23	Realizing that each country's industrial development progress differs based on
24	economic and social situations unique to that country,
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26	Recognizing that skilled workers in developing countries emigrate to more
27	developed states due to better job opportunities,
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29	1. Draws attention to the disadvantages that industry-specific subsidies and
30	market dumping create, as well as revenue short comings in developing countries export
31	indusrties due to unreciprocated access to foreign markets;

2. *Recommends* that all Member States contribute to international development
 cooperation in order to create more self-sufficient economies among developing states
 around the world, expanding opportunities for increased global trade by encouraging
 assistance in financing manufacturing and processing facilities for primary production;

38 3. *Calls upon* governments of Member States, transnational corporations, and non-39 governmental organizations to expand and maintain foreign direct investment by building 40 and maintaining infrastructure such as roads and railways in rural areas and focusing on 41 increasing trade capacity and educational opportunities for the rural populations around 42 the world;

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44 4. *Encourages* the international community to offer expanded support for Member
 45 States struggling to attain their Millennium Development Goals through information
 46 sharing, direct investment, skill development through education and supporting increased
 47 international trade;

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5. *Strongly Recommends* an annual conference about specified industries to be
 held among willing South-South and North-South partners to share the latest innovations
 in technology and industrial enhancements experienced within their own borders for the
 sake of bettering future cooperation;

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6. Urges member nations to implement poverty reduction strategies aimed at
providing greater educational opportunities, improving health-care infrastructure,
working conditions and wages for its population;

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58 7. *Encourages* the expansion of access to their micro-credit and micro-financing
 59 programs as a means to precisely target diverse segments of the population to improve
 60 their standards of living;

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*Requests* that the international community continue to consider new methods of
environmentally sustainable industrial development when seeking to improve the
efficiency of production in developing countries.
