## The Third Committee

*Recalling* that all Member States have pledged to uphold the Charter of the United
Nations, to promote and encourage universal respect for and observance of human rights
and fundamental freedoms for all without distinction as to race, sex, language, religion, or
belief,

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6 Affirming the relevance of international standards of human rights enumerated 7 within the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, Declaration on the Elimination of All 8 Forms of Intolerance and of Discrimination Based on Religion or Belief, International 9 Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Racial Discrimination, International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights, Convention on the Rights of the Child, 10 International Covenant on Economic, Social, and Cultural Rights, Convention on the 11 12 Elimination of Discrimination Against Women, and International Convention on the 13 Protection of the Rights of All Migrant Workers and Their Families, to all people, 14 15 Noting the efforts of the 2001 World Conference against Racism, Racial Discrimination, Xenophobia and Related Intolerance and the World Programme for 16 17 Human Rights Education to create human rights and social teaching programs, 18 19 *Recognizing* the need for internal mechanisms to better implement standards of 20 religious freedom and equality, 21 22 Further affirming the act of tolerance to be a promotion of just treatment and 23 equal access to opportunity for all citizens of all states regardless of religious difference, 24 25 *Understanding* that some member states lack the necessary resources to fully 26 implement all existing and desired programs regarding the protection and upholding of 27 religious freedoms, 28 29 Concerned that not all member states possess clearly enumerated protection of

30 31	religious rights within their civil, penal, labor, and administrative documents and codes,
32	Believing the universal and unconditional freedoms of thought, conscience,
33	religion, and belief for all people should be taught by civil education programs at all
34	levels of public schooling, as this will encourage tolerant adult populations,
35	revers of public schooling, as this will cheoticage toterant adult populations,
36	<i>Further recognizing</i> the need for alternative methods of education where
37	traditional educational programs are not viable,
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39	Commending the existing efforts of Non-Governmental Organizations to promote
40	religious freedom and tolerance in all its aspects,
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42	Noting that religious freedom is intimately linked to human security and
43	dependent on individuals' ability to enjoy fulfilled, materially secure, and dignified lives,
44	ensured by governments that respect and protect human rights,
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46	Acknowledging the irrevocable sovereignty of every Member State in regards to
47	implementing internal reform,
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49	1. Appeals to Member States to ratify the existing Declaration on the Elimination
50	of All Forms of Intolerance and of Discrimination Based on Religion or Belief,
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52	2. <i>Strongly recommends</i> that every member state incorporate protection of
53	individual religious freedom within their individual penal code, with assistance
54	and collaboration from the respective nations' regional body, including:
55	(a) Protection from forced conversion;
56	(b) Establishment and protection of culturally and religiously diverse
57	education on all levels;
58	(c) Protection of the right to congregate;
59	(d) Freedom of speech;
60	2. Calle for the exection of a conference to promote international human accurity
61 62	3. <i>Calls for</i> the creation of a conference to promote international human security
62 63	and respect of religious freedom that will: (a) Facilitate multilateral discussion between nations that exhibit abuse of
64	religious freedom;
65	(b) Allow member states to work with ECOSOC to establish financial
66	means to enforce state's individual protective measures and foster economic stability;
67	(c) Work collaboratively with each State's government to establish an
68	individual plan of action for each member state to achieve full compliance with the UN
69	Declaration of Human Rights and;
70	(d) Establish consultative firms which would serve minority religious
71	groups within each nation and provide legal assistance;
72	(e) Promote conversation regarding the integration of technology to
73	religious tolerance;
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75	4. Implores all nations to incorporate religious tolerance with the ultimate goal of

76	acceptance within civil education programs in all state sponsored educational
77	programs beginning at the early childhood level, including but not limited to:
78	(a) Conflict resolution and consensus building;
79	(b) Team building skills;
80	(c) Peace studies;
81	(d) Cultural differences and cultural anthropology;
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83	5. Encourages all nations to work cooperatively with existing Non-Governmental
84	Organizations and consider the Special Rapporteur on Freedom of Religious Rights'
85	recommendations to establish grass roots efforts in promoting religious education and
86	tolerance programs where conventional programs cannot be implemented and the
87	adequate facilities to do so;
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89	6. Further encourages member states to establish bodies to oversee NGO actions
90	within their governments for the purpose of regulation and registration within their
91	borders;
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93	7. Endorses cooperation with local, regional and international bodies to oversee
94	and mediate in religious conflict areas, especially concerning non-state actors;
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96	8. Recommends the establishment of locally and regionally based training
97	programs and institutes to better prepare member states to handle abuses of religious
98	rights and freedoms and to advise religious tolerance education programs to be facilitated
99	by NGO's, with respect to individual state sovereignty;
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101	9. <i>Resolves</i> to remain actively seized in the matter.
