6 7	Recalling the principles of Resolution A.RES.62/86 (2007),
8 9	Having considered the limitations of the Kyoto Protocol in its current form,
10	<i>Noting</i> the expiration of the Kyoto protocol in 2012 and the necessity of a new
11	global framework including global participation that will address the mid and long-term
12	effects of climate change,
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14	Having studied existing financial structures outlined in the Monterrey Consensus,
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16	Affirming the belief that it is ultimately the responsibility of national governments
17	to deliver credible and national plans for the implementation of projects,
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19	<i>Expressing</i> its satisfaction in the success achieved on the regional level through
20	existing programmes,

22	<i>Observing</i> the unique opportunity in developing countries to implement greener
23	infrastructures, and recognizing the need of some countries lacking resources and
24	technology to get assistance from the international community,

27	commitments made in the Climate Change Kyoto Protocol and subsequent pronouncements;

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30	2. <i>Calls upon</i> countries to extend their personal commitments to climate change,
31	and requests governments to set environmental issues as a priority, whenever possible;
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33	3. Encourages national governments to integrate environmental development in
34	their development strategies in order to stimulate sustainable development and healthy
35	economic growth;
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37	4. Supports efforts of National Action Plans for Energy Efficiency;
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39	5. Seeks the close cooperation among existing Non Governmental Organizations,
40	related organizations and other international aid agencies for promoting and funding
41	implementation of the convention;

43	6. Affirms the need for an information sharing platform to promote universal
44	cooperation between municipal authorities, scientific institutions and the relevant private
45	sector institutions for promoting environmental programmes including, but not limited to:
46	(a) Environmental training and education to inform, specifically:
47	(i) Sharing environment technology;
48	(ii) Education on the appropriate use of resources;
49	(iii) Scholarship foundation for exchanging students from
50	developing countries to receive education on environmental issues;
51	(b) Energy efficiency;

54	7. Believes that all research should be made available as widely as possible;

56	8. <i>Encourages</i> the mobilization of financial resources from innovative financial
57	mechanisms (such as tax incentives and cap and trade);

59	9. Strongly supports the creation of a World Climate Change Fund to address
60	pressing short-term issues in order to establish fully functional long-term cooperative
61	solutions, including but not limited to:
62	(a) Help vulnerable countries to adapt to climate changes;
63	(b) Stimulate research globally;
64	(c) Fund promising grass-root initiatives, NGOs and private
65	entrepreneurship;
66	(d) Funding government initiatives and programmes;
67	(e) Fund sustainable agricultural development;

69	10. Stresses the importance of recognizing the need to address short-term issues
70	through the World Climate Change Fund, provided that benefiting nations prove a true
71	commitment to accomplish long-term goals cooperatively;
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73	11. <i>Recognizes</i> the special oppurtunity in post-conflict and developing regions to
74	rebuild using greener policies;

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76 12. *Strongly requests* the parties to the Bali-process to evaluate the mechanisms of
administering and funding projects addressing climate change;
