Reaffirming the endeavors of Public-Private Partnerships, such as the Global Fund to Fight Aids, Tuberculosis and Malaria, and the Global Alliance for Vaccine Immunization,

1. *Urges* Member States to work within the framework of public-private partnerships, in an effort to increase the number of, and access to health-care professionals in developing countries;

2. *Recommends* that Member States also provide support for NGOs and United Nations subsidiaries that provide resources for health-care professionals;

3. *Encourages* the aforementioned organizations to focus their efforts on not only providing health-care professionals for physical aid but also preventative measures, such as education concerning:

(a) Infectious diseases;

(b) Maternal prenatal, postnatal, perinatal care;

(c) Safety for children;

4. *Further encourages* those organizations to assist Member States in strengthening pre-existing health services, similar to the work done by the cooperation between the Gates Foundation and Merck Botswana comprehensive HIV/AIDS;

5. *Pledges* to implement development stratagems that are rooted in the lessons learned from the Annual Ministerial Reviews, in an effort to reach the MDGs.
