SUBJECT OF RESOLUTION: Improvement of the Situation of Women in Rural

Areas

Recalling the Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action drafted in 1995 and emphasizing solutions to the problem of gender disparity and Article 14 of the Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination against women which highlights the struggle of women in rural areas, as well as the Beijing +5 Conference which advocated increased investment in microfinance projects to empower women in developing countries,

Reaffirming the tenets of the United Nations Millennium Declaration, including the elimination of gender disparity,

Additionally reaffirming the vital role, which women play in breaking the cycle of extreme poverty as exhibited in the recent success of microcredit projects such as the Grameen Bank,

Recognizing the responsibility of the individual Member States as well as the international community to continue such projects to empower women in their communities,

Additionally recognizing the need for all member states to put forth a serious effort to meet the goal of 50/50 gender balance within the United Nations system as well as within the political systems of each individual member state,

Deeply concerned by the continued exploitation of women in rural areas through directed acts of violence, human trafficking, as well as economic disfranchisement,

Guided by the principle established by the United Nations Millennium Declaration in its declaration of September 2000 and reiterated by the General Assembly in its resolution 62/186 (2008) of 31 January 2008, namely that all member states must cooperate in an expanded global partnership for development to achieve the Millennium Development Goals by the desired year of 2015,

- 1. *Urges* all States to support a renewed effort to combat rural poverty by investing in the women in these areas by:
- (a) Dedicating a significant percent of their official development assistance to projects, which train and educate women and girls in rural areas including a substantial effort to train new

 female teachers in developing countries;

- (b) Supporting the development of mobile educational units to deliver equitable access to education for marginalized populations of women in rural areas;
- (c) Providing free lunch programs for children and proper sanitation for girls at rural schools;
- (d) Expanding the availability of microcredit loans and similar venture projects to allow individual women and groups of women to start up their own businesses and then pay back the loans with their profits so that more women can be empowered;
- 2. Calls for a partnership between the Global North and the Global South to allow the creation and maintenance of an online open source textbook project which would greatly reduce the costs of education in developing countries as well as enable local, female teachers to access and contribute to this academic content;
- 3. *Requests* that all States work to increase the access of healthcare services to women in rural areas by supporting traveling medical teams and other mobile sources of healthcare to reach women in these isolated regions;
- 4. *Urges* all member states to work in partnership with the World Health Organization as well as other local, state and international NGOs to create health facilities in all member nations, specifically in rural areas, that are equipped to deal with women's health issues and for these women to have easy access to them;
- 5. Condemns violence against women in all forms and strongly encourages all member states to fully realize the value of women being equal to that of men and being central to the development of their respective States;
- 6. Strongly urges Member States that have not yet ratified the Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination Against Women (CEDAW) to do so without delay and those who have ratified to further implement the goals of the convention through those laws already in place in their respective regions;
- 7. Further Recommends that the scope of the CEDAW Committee be expanded to allow the committee to refer severely deadlocked issues to the General Assembly for additional discussion;
- 8. *Reminds* all states of their responsibility under the United Nations Charter to comply with all relevant United Nations resolutions on this matter.
