1 Recalling resolution A/RES/60/74, passed in 2005, which deals with problems arising

from the accumulation of stockpiles, as well as the progress of the Programme of Action

to Prevent, Combat, and Eradicate the Illicit Trade in Small Arms and Light Weapons in

All Its Aspects,

> Alarmed by the extent to which illicit small arms trafficking exacerbates domestic and regional conflicts, and crime,

> Concerned that past resolutions on the topics of disarmament and regulation have not been effective and often fall victim to loopholes,

12 Encouraging Member States to adopt the United Nations-LiREC program 'Training the

13 Trainers', which provides national military officials with courses on firearms,

investigative techniques and seminars on detecting the trafficking of illicit ammunition, in 14

15 efforts to facilitate an efficient international information exchange system between special

units and national authorities, as well as create better monitoring on global borders, 16

17

18 Aware of the efforts of the Organization for Security and Cooperation, in Europe, through

19 the arms trading 'Code of Conduct' which has effectively dealt with the illegal arms trade 20

by denying arms to human rights violators,

21

22 *Encouraged* by the fact that multinational border cooperation has worked to limit this

23 illicit trade,

25 Acknowledging the right of all nations to govern themselves and to create their own 26 legislature,

1. Requests all nations to open dialogues with their neighbors to establish cooperative

29 border oversight to prevent the smuggling of arms;

31 2. Encourages all nations to adopt the UN-LiRec program, 'Training the Trainers', in 32 order to promote cooperation in border patrol between neighbors, thereby decreasing the 33 illegal activities not only of illicit arms trade, but also of the illegal activities that stem 34 from this form of trade:

36 3. Reminds Member States of the United Nations Conference on the Arms Trade Treaty in 37 2012 to discuss accountability for and the reduction of surpluses of small arms and 38 weapons and to further discuss the standards for the import, export, and transfer of 39 conventional arms and additionally:

(a) Tasks Work Group 3 and the Group of Governmental Experts, already established by the United Nations, to review current United Nations policy and past resolutions dealing with small arms and conventional weapons, including the United Nations Registry for Conventional Arms, and to refer recommendations to the General Assembly on closing

loopholes in these documents in order to make them more effective:

(b) Strongly urges Member States to take responsibility of the implementation of annual disarmament programs to prevent the diversion of legal arms to the illegal market, as well as to promote humanitarian efforts to aid victims of disputes effected by small arms;

(c) That this United Nations Conference will reconvene every five years for the purpose of updating the Treaty and maintaining relevancy in an ever changing;

4. Further recommends the commencement of a gradual move towards the depletion of stockpiles of such arms;

55 5. Urges Member States to ensure their national policies are in accordance with 56 international law;

59 60 6. Encourages Member States to require their arms manufacturers to adhere to the International Tracing Standards contained in the recommendations of the Group of Governmental Experts in the 2008 Towards an Arms Trade Treaty: Recommendations, which provides for universal marking standards;

7. Asks weapons producers to refrain from transferring weapons to non-state actors, defined as bodies not recognized by the United Nations, especially those non-state actors known to who commit human rights violations;

67 8. Urges the use of international import certificates, defined as the documents which 68 accompany the weapon during a transaction, beyond the first export destination;

70 9. Encourages the creation of a licensing process for arms brokers within each Member 71 State:

72 (a) This licensing process would facilitate tracking and monitoring of a key component in 73 the illicit arms trade;

74 (b) The data gathered from this licensing process would aid the analysis of global arms trends;
10. Supports the work of International Action Network on Small Arms, which strives to safely eliminate the danger that small arms pose to world, and non-governmental organizations to aid countries' in safely disposing of their weapons stockpiles;
11. Urges regional cooperation and negotiation for the purpose of unilateral disarmament;
12. Acknowledges the responsibility of the United Nations to protect each member state in
