2 3 4	<i>Emphasizing</i> the United Nations recognition of rape and all other forms of sexual violence as an important issue that requires extensive support from all nations,
6 7 8	<i>Approving</i> the use of educational mechanisms to lessen the extent of sexual violence,
8 9 10	<i>Recognizing</i> the importance of state sovereignty and cultural identity of all active participants in the United Nations,
12 13	<i>Further recognizing</i> the need for continued and increased aid and support from the United Nations to eliminate sexual violence,
15 16	Acknowledging that both men and women are in need of support and education in order to eliminate sexual violence in all of its manifestations,
18 19 20	<i>Recalling</i> the Beijing Declaration Platform for Action and the Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination against Women (CEDAW) as a means to protect and empower women against acts of sexual violence,
22 23 24	<i>Further acknowledging</i> the importance of Security Council Resolution 1325, which emphasizes the magnitude of violence against women in armed conflict and post-conflict situations, as they are most vulnerable to such acts,
26 27 28	<i>Fully aware</i> that conflict and post-conflict zones are prone to sexual violence due to their social and economic instability,
29 30 31	1. <i>Affirms</i> the ideals expressed in Article 55 of the UN Charter in regards to its role in promoting the welfare of the citizens of its constituent members;

32	2. Encourages the incorporation of Non-Governmental Organizations (NGOs),
33	that are supported by the UN, in the planning and execution of educational mechanisms
34	within the school system and civil society to provide aid to victims of sexual violence;
