SUBJECT OF RESOLUTION: Eliminating Rape and Other Forms of Sexual Violence in All Their Manifestations SUBMITTED TO: The General Assembly Third Committee SUBMITTED BY: Cape Verde, Algeria, Sierra Leone, Swaziland, Democratic Republic of the Congo, Ethiopia The General Assembly Third Committee Recalling all past action by the United Nations in accordance with the issue such as: (A/61/438), (A/62/433), (A/61/433[Part II]), (SC 1325 [2000]), (SC 1820[2008]), Observing Report A/63/216 of the General Assembly in 2008 regarding sexual violence, Guided by the purposes and principles of the Charter of the United Nations, Alarmed by the fact that one in every three women is faced with sexual violence, Deeply concerned that despite the fact that 73 million males under the age of eighteen are raped every year, and millions of males over the age of eighteen are silenced by societal stigmas, there is no action taken towards effective inclusion of this gender in the solutions to the issue. Deeply disturbed about the pervasiveness of violence against women and girls in all its different forms and manifestations worldwide, and reiterating the need to intensify efforts to prevent and eliminate all forms of violence throughout the world, Congratulating those Nations in which the prevalence of sexual violence in all of its manifestations has been reduced, and where safe facilities have been successfully established to further reduce such violence. Recognizing that rape is not the only focus and that many forms of sexual violence occur and all deserve adequate attention,

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Expressing its appreciation for the activities taken by the United Nations bodies, entities, funds and programs and specialized nations that have been prosecuting crimes of a sexual nature,

Allows countries to utilize UNiTE aid to enforce UNiTE goals in however way 86 87 they see fit so long as it follows 3rd committee and UNiTE guidelines and 88 recommendations; 89 90 6. Recommends that countries use this aid to address issues such as: 91 (a) Building and maintaining shelters for victims of abuse; 92 (b) Training of police forces, government workers and lawyers to deal with 93 the psychological effects on victims: (c) Prosecution of the offenders. 94
