4 5 6 7	<i>Recalling</i> the Convention on the Rights of the Child, International Labor Organization (ILO) Convention No. 182, and ILO Convention No. 138, which all call for the protection of a child's rights as well as the eradication of child labor,	
8 9 10	<i>Noting</i> the important progress made so far and new goals outlined in "A World Fit For Children" and the Millennium Development Goals,	
10 11 12	Addressing ideas and goals	outlined in "Education For All,"
12 13 14 15	<i>Recognizing</i> that the European Union has expressed interest in increasing funding for programs combating the issue of child labor in the global community,	
16 17	1. Encourages States to prov	vide compulsory primary education;

7. *Recognizing* the need for article 10.5 of the Roadmap for Achieving the
Elimination of the Worst Forms of Child Labour by 2016 that NGOs should be utilized by
States to engage "children and their families in an inclusive and participatory manner so
that policy makers can consider their views when developing policies" to be implemented
by States;
