SUBJECT OF RESOLUTION: Status of the Convention on the Rights of the Child as it Relates to Child Labor SUBMITTED TO: The General Assembly Third Committee SUBMITTED BY: The Republic of Rwanda, Burkina Faso, Cameroon, Chile, Democratic Republic of the Congo, Djibouti, Estonia, Ethiopia, Gabon, Haiti, Myanmar, Nigeria, Syrian Arab Republic, Uganda The General Assembly Third Committee *Recognizing* that child labor is often a result of poverty and conflict, *Understanding* that many families depend upon assistance from their children in order to survive, Aware that education plays a major role in reducing the worst forms of child labor, Stressing that the blame for child labor does not rest upon states, Discouraging the existence of the worst forms of child labor, Applauding the work of regional Non-governmental organizations (NGOs), such as the International Rescue Committee (IRC), to provide alternative basic education, which provides flexible timetables for helping children in communities with high rates of child labor, Recognizing that child labor is a global problem, and combating child labor is the responsibility of every nation, whether developed or developing, Making note that the problem of child labor is circular, and cannot be resolved with one universal solution, but rather depends upon a multitude of innovate ideas collaborating, 1. Calls upon Member States to create their own minimum age limits for employment in respect for national sovereignty, with respect for the Convention on the Rights of the

2. Encourages Member States to establish and enforce their own national minimum

wage, as determined by the individual state;

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30 3. *Further encourages* states to place regulations on work environment safety and maximum working hours;

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4. *Calls* for NGOs to provide community support and education directly to guardians and children within a country, with the permission of the state;

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5. Further calls for Member States to invite NGOs to measure and evaluate, with the permission of the state in which they operate, the country's compliance with the abovementioned regulations that the state has established;

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6. *Requests* already developed Member States and international organizations to provide
financial aid to the above-mentioned NGOs for education purposes;

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7. *Encourages* Member States to consider the recommendations of the international community in regard to child labor regulations;

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- 8. *Further requests* Member States and international organizations to provide economic incentives to developing countries for combating the worst forms of child labor by
- 48 reallocating pre-existing contributions, in exchange for voluntary regulations that
- approach alignment with the global community's standards, as measured by NGOs such as:
- 51 (a) United Nations International Children's Education Fund, Save the Children, and regional NGOs, including the IRC.
