## By Whose Authority?

AMUN prides itself on simulating the United Nations' proceedings "in the real world." To facilitate this, AMUN staff members are trained to review draft resolutions to make certain they are within purview. Purview defines the scope of a particular topic that each committee or council is allowed to address. AMUN Dais staff will review resolutions to ensure they are focused and within the scope of the committee's or council's ability to address for the particular topic. AMUN assigns each of the main GA Committees specific topics to discuss during each session. Since every Member State has a seat in each General Assembly committee, it is important that the points of discussion do not over-

lap, especially if the topic is very broad. Thus even if two or more committees are discussing a general topic, each committee is made responsible for discussing a very specific point or aspect of that top-

For example, the Fourth Committee may discuss the Israel-Palestine conflict with regard to its political components. However, issues concerning the legal consequences of the conflict should be left to the Sixth Committee and the Security Council would address issues relating to warfare and sanctions. Therefore, Representatives in each committee should take care not to expand the discussion of any topic beyond the limitations set by their committee's mandate into another committee's area of discussion. This boundary becomes important when it comes time to draft a resolution that attempts to resolve the problems associated with the specific or particular issue in the topic area.

When drafting resolutions, Representatives may find it useful to consult the purview sections in the *Is*sues of AMUN handbook, located at the beginning of the GA's and individual committee's background

Rapporteurs and Home Government members are trained to help representatives ensure their draft resolutions are within the purview of their committee to discuss. Representatives are encouraged to speak with their Rapporteur or with Home Government, including the Special Rapporteurs, if they have any questions or concerns about their resolution being within purview.

### John W. McArthur, AMUN Keynote Speaker

John W. McArthur is the Chief Executive Officer of Millennium Promise, the leading international non-profit organization solely committed to supporting the achievement of the Millennium Development Goals to halve extreme poverty by 2015. In this capacity he oversees the Millennium Villages project, which supports integrated social and business development services for more than 400,000 people in rural communities across 10 countries in Africa. Dr. McArthur is also a Research Associate at the Earth Institute at Columbia University, where he previously served as Policy Director, and teaches at Columbia's School of International and Public Af-

In 2007 and 2008 he cochaired the International Commission on Education for Sus-

tainable Development Practice, an initiative sponsored by the MacArthur Foundation to identify the cross-disciplinary training requirements for the next generation of sustainable development practitioners. He now co-chairs the International Advisory Board of the ongoing effort to launch a new global network of Masters in Development Practice programs.

Previously, Dr. McArthur served as Deputy Director and Manager of the UN Millennium Project. He completed a Masters and Doctorate in Economics at Oxford University, which he attended as a Rhodes Scholar; a Masters in Public Policy at Harvard University's John F Kennedy School of Government; and a Bachelor of Arts (Honours) at the University of British Columbia.

### SAFETY at AMUN

American Model United Nations (AMUN) places extreme importance on the safety of our participants and guests. We hope that you have an excellent and fun learning experience while at the Conference, but encourage everyone to consider safety issues in and around the Conference hotels. We also suggest that you follow several common sense rules to keep all participants safe during the conference. These include:

- As a general rule, do not leave the hotel grounds without letting your group know how to find you.
- Always let one of the leaders of your group (faculty, club or organization officer, etc.) know

where you are going prior to leaving the hotel or area around it (to visit local friends or relatives, etc.).

- Never leave any of the hotels alone, especially after dark.
- Always travel with at least one person that you know.
- Always remove your name tag prior to leaving the hotel so as not to advertise yourself as a "tourist."
- Help other participants to be safe by encouraging others to not travel outside of the hotel alone.
- Inform one of the leaders of your group immediately if you have a safety concern, or if any emergency situation occurs to you or another participant, regardless of the time. Remember that safety should always be

more important than avoiding minor embarrassment to you or another person.

Please feel free to contact the AMUN staff at any time during the Conference, day or night, if any emergency or similar event occurs where we can be of assistance. We can be reached in PDR 1, located on the third level of the Hilton Hotel, or find any Secretariat member wearing a blue badge. If an emergency occurs that requires immediate help, you should also feel free to contact Hotel Security by dialing "0" and asking the operator for "security."

## Diplomatic Courtesy Starts in Your Suitcase

The appearance of participants at provides **AMUN** the first impressions of their delegation to other Representatives. Attention to proper appearance sets an expectation professionalism competence. In order to demonstrate respect to fellow Representatives, Secretariat members, and distinguished guests of the Conference, AMUN requires business Western

attire during all formal sessions, including the final General Assembly sessions on Tuesday.

As noted on pages 3-4 of the AMUN Rules and Procedures handbook, AMUN's dress code is defined as follows: Western business attire is a business jacket or suit, dress slacks (or a skirt for women), dress shirt (with a tie for men), and dress shoes. Attire should follow the rule of being appropriate for visiting an embassy. Revealing dress shirts that expose excessive bare skin on the chest or

stomach are not appropriate. Sweaters are generally considered too casual for Western business attire. Clothing that reveals undergarments in any way, including being too tight, is not appropriate. AMUN will not consider any manner of dress appropriate which includes T-shirts, jeans, shorts, hats, athletic shoes or any form of commercial advertising.

Participants also shall not wear the traditional or religious garb of any state or organization. The only ex-

ception to this is required traditional or religious garb from Representative's personal religion or culture. Additionparticipants ally, should not affect mannerisms, linguistic characteristics, or any other perceived traits of a state or culture that they are representing. These affectations are inappropriate and may be seen as offensive by other students, or by natives of that State or culture.

Please be aware that Representatives who are not appropriately attired

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or who do not follow these rules may not be recognized during formal debate in any AMUN simulation. Further, AMUN reserves the right to refuse admittance to the Conference floor to any Representative who is inappropriately attired or who violates the above provisions. Decisions of appropriate attire and professional behavior are at the ultimate discretion of the Secretariat.
