SUBJECT OF RESOLUTION: Global Initiative to Fight Human Trafficking

SUBMITTED TO: The General Assembly Plenary

The General Assembly Plenary,

Bearing in mind the goals and initiatives set forth by the United Nations Global Plan of Action to Combat Trafficking in Persons,

Reaffirming that preventative measures against human trafficking are critical to successfully eradicating human trafficking,

Deeply convinced that education is the crux of successful preventative measures,

Noting with concern that inadequately prosecuting human traffickers enables them to reach their destructive goals,

Aware that the issue of trafficking in persons is transnational in nature and requires the attention of the global community,

- 1. *Encourages* the education of government officials and other civil servants including judges and security personnel in regards to recognizing signs of human trafficking and knowing ways in which to efficiently deal with situations pertaining to human trafficking;
- 2. *Recommends* the implementation of vocational schools to create viable alternative job opportunities to potential victims of human trafficking;
- 3. *Further suggests* that these vocational schools be used to help the communities hosting them to flourish by requiring that students apply the skills learned from the vocational schools to work within the host community for a period of at least a year:
- (a) Using for reference Panama's scholarship model Becas de Pregrado de Excelencia (Undergraduate Scholarship of Excellence) and its successes in promoting economic growth within communities;
- (b) Confident that this program would be highly sustainable and continue to promote growth over time;
 - 4. *Urges* Member States with lax Trafficking in Persons (TIP) laws to enact more severe punishments on those guilty of trafficking in an effort to deter participation in this heinous act, as well as ensuring that anti-trafficking in persons laws are enforced using Thailand's successes in prosecution and prevention of human traffickers as a model for reference;
