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- 7. Suggests with exigency that the UNMACCs work directly with communities significantly affected by landmines and other explosive remnants of war to:
- (a) Teach residents of these regions best practices about landmines as outlined by UNMAS Mine Risk Education Best Practice Guidebook:
- (b) Disseminate information gathered by the United Nations Office for Project Services (UNOPS) as outlined below;
- (c) Provide comprehensive education uniquely tailored to the needs of different demographic groups;
- 8. Calls upon UNOPS to gather information on the effects of landmines and other explosive remnants of war, including:
 - (a) How restricted movement caused by landmines harms peoples living conditions;
 - (b) The effects on victims who have been directly harmed by landmines;
 - (c) The fiscal needs of nations to remove landmines from key areas;
- 9. Urges UNMAS to consider the data gathered by UNOPS as outlined above as well as data gathered by Landmine Impact Surveys;
- 10. *Invites* all nations to cooperate with UNOPS in their efforts to increase gathering of data on the effects of landmines:
- 11. Further calls upon UNMAS to cooperate with national governments to establish mass education campaigns:
 - (a) Through mass media and public education systems;
- (b) Involving public figures such as world leaders and United Nations Goodwill Ambassadors:
- 12. Recommends UNMAS to use its UNMACC to support victim assistance, involving:
 - (a) Medical care;
 - (b) Rehabilitative therapy:
 - (c) Resources for victims to cope with disabilities;
 - (d) Education and employment opportunities;
- 13. Strongly urges UNMAS and all member states and non-governmental organizations to cooperate to establish national mine action services for the purpose of:
 - (a) Enabling nations to have more self-direction in mine action;
- (b) Fully capitalizing on their unique understanding of how mines and other explosive remnants of war affect their country;
 - (c) Bringing local actors directly into demining efforts;
- 14. Urges those nations most affected by mines and improvised explosive devices to cooperate with United Nations Office for Project Services to find comprehensive data on emplaced mines and improvised explosive devices;

15. *Applauds* the efforts of non-governmental organizations to further the goals of assistance in mine action;

16. *Requests* that member states with the means to do so support research into low cost, ecologically friendly alternative methods of demining including those that have been proposed by non-governmental organizations;

17. Advises UNMAS to allocate funds in line with the findings of United Nations Office for Project Services;

18. *Suggests* to the Secretary General that efforts in mine action outlined here for UNMAS be consolidated thoroughly under UNMAS so as not to duplicate efforts in other United Nations bodies such as the Department for Peacekeeping Operations, the United Nations Development Program, and the United Nations Children's Fund.
