- (a) Promoting the signing of the Mine Ban Treaty of 3 December 1997 and the Convention on Cluster Munitions:
- (b) Promoting reliably consistent donations to the Voluntary Trust Fund for Assistance in Mine Action, in line with the financial capacities of potential donors;
