4. Calls upon all factions in the regions of Bosnia-Herzegovina, Yugoslavia, and

Croatia to begin peace talks in the interest of promoting a long-term solution;

Reaffirms the creation of the following safe zones that were designated by UN 42 Security Council Resolutions 824, 836, 844, and 859: 43 (a) Sarajevo: 44 (i) This safe zone will be given priority in the case that not enough troops can be 45 sent to protect all six of the safe zones listed here, in the interest of providing effective 46 protection to the capital of Bosnia; 47 (b) Tuzla, 48 (i) This safe zone will be given second priority due to recognized strategic 49 military value, as well as the use of the regional airport, to be further discussed later in 50 the resolution: 51 (c) Zepa; 52 (d) Gorazde; 53 (e) Bihac; 54 (f) Srebrenica: 55 6. Takes note of the figures established by the 1993 October meeting held by the 56 57 Working Group on Humanitarian Issues stating the requirements of 522 million dollars 58 for the January to June 1994 campaign meant to benefit the population of former 59 Yugoslavia totaling 4.259 million persons; 60 61 7. Authorizes an increase in military personnel to the region by 5000 62 peacekeeping troops to be contributed by member states and the joint NATO programs 63 (as volunteered) for the purpose of: 64 (a) Ensuring the transportation of humanitarian aid to safe zones and UN outposts; 65 (b) Defending the military safe zones as well as monitoring border disputes; 66 (c)Reporting movements of military supplies and troops: 67 8. Confirms the commitment to the use of necessary force in enforcing the 68 69 regional no-fly zones as authorized in Resolution 816; 70 71 9. Suggests the reopening of the Tuzla airport for the purpose of transporting 72 humanitarian aid to the region of Bosnia-Herzegovina, 73 (a) Under exclusive UNPROFOR authority for the delivery of humanitarian 74 supplies and related purposes; 75 10. Decides to extend portions of the mandate of UNPROFOR for an additional 76 77 period terminating on 31 December 1994 in the interest of accomplishing the objectives
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set forth in this resolution;

- 11. *Endorses* the creation of a 20km international weapons exclusion zone expanding from the center, geographically, of the designated military safe zones within Bosnia-Herzegovina in order to help distinguish between military movement and aggression;
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- 12. Decides to remain actively seized on the matter.
