SUBJECT OF RESOLUTION: Situation in Bosnia-Herzegovina

SUBMITTED TO: The Historical Security Council -- 1994

*The United Nations Security Council,*

1        *Recognizing* the urgency of the conflict in the region of Bosnia-Herzegovina,

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3        *Recalling* the numerous human rights violations that have been committed in the  
4 region,

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6        *Noting with deep concern* the obstacles preventing humanitarian aid from  
7 reaching civilians in need,

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9        *Keeping in mind* the dangers of further escalating an already tense situation,

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11        *Confident* in the effectiveness of greater numbers of peacekeeping troops to  
12 protect safe zones previously established in Security Council Resolutions 824, 836, 844,  
13 and 859,

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15        *Desiring* to help the civilians who have been affected by the violence,

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17        *Emphasizing* the importance of a multilateral solution,

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19        *Seeking* the commencement of peace talks between the Bosnians, the Croats, and  
20 the Serbs,

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22        1. *Condemns* the human rights violations being committed in the region of  
23 Bosnia-Herzegovina, including but not limited to:

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25        (a) Attacks on civilians;

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27        (b) Ethnic cleansing campaigns;

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29        2. *Expresses* the need to preserve the national sovereignty and territorial integrity  
30 of Bosnia-Herzegovina, Yugoslavia, and Croatia with the borders established post 2  
31 March 1992;

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33        3. *Urges* the factions within Bosnia-Herzegovina, Yugoslavia, and Croatia to  
34 enact an immediate ceasefire;

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36        4. *Calls upon* all factions in the regions of Bosnia-Herzegovina, Yugoslavia, and  
Croatia to begin peace talks in the interest of promoting a long-term solution;

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5. *Reaffirms* the creation of the following safe zones that were designated by UN Security Council Resolutions 824, 836, 844, and 859:

- (a) Sarajevo;
  - (i) This safe zone will be given priority in the case that not enough troops can be sent to protect all six of the safe zones listed here, in the interest of providing effective protection to the capital of Bosnia;
- (b) Tuzla,
  - (i) This safe zone will be given second priority due to recognized strategic military value, as well as the use of the regional airport, to be further discussed later in the resolution;
- (c) Zepa;
- (d) Gorazde;
- (e) Bihac;
- (f) Srebrenica;

6. *Takes note of* the figures established by the 1993 October meeting held by the Working Group on Humanitarian Issues stating the requirements of 522 million dollars for the January to June 1994 campaign meant to benefit the population of former Yugoslavia totaling 4.259 million persons;

7. *Authorizes* an increase in military personnel to the region by 5000 peacekeeping troops to be contributed by member states and the joint NATO programs (as volunteered) for the purpose of:

- (a) Ensuring the transportation of humanitarian aid to safe zones and UN outposts;
- (b) Defending the military safe zones as well as monitoring border disputes;
- (c) Reporting movements of military supplies and troops;

8. *Confirms* the commitment to the use of necessary force in enforcing the regional no-fly zones as authorized in Resolution 816;

9. *Suggests* the reopening of the Tuzla airport for the purpose of transporting humanitarian aid to the region of Bosnia-Herzegovina,

- (a) Under exclusive UNPROFOR authority for the delivery of humanitarian supplies and related purposes;

10. *Decides* to extend portions of the mandate of UNPROFOR for an additional period terminating on 31 December 1994 in the interest of accomplishing the objectives set forth in this resolution;

11. *Endorses* the creation of a 20km international weapons exclusion zone expanding from the center, geographically, of the designated military safe zones within Bosnia-Herzegovina in order to help distinguish between military movement and aggression;

12. *Decides* to remain actively seized on the matter.
