SUBJECT OF RESOLUTION: United Nations Public-Private Alliance for Rural Development

SUBMITTED TO: The Economic and Social Council

The Economic and Social Council,

1 *Reiterating* the importance of a strong partnership between the public and private sectors in the development 2 of rural areas,

Recognizing that 70 percent of the world's poor who live in rural areas depend on agriculture as a main source of income and employment,

5 Deeply concerned that commodity producers in rural areas are not reaping the benefits that these producers 6 sow,

Emphasizing the need of agricultural development as an important asset to the public and private alliance to rural development,

9 Recognizing with appreciation the advances in data collection made by previous resolutions passed by nu-10 merous United Nations bodies,

11 *Noting with regret* that rural entrepreneurs often do not have the financial and technical capacity to start 12 up and sustain their businesses,

Further noting that donor money and public subsidies are insufficient in meeting the demand and needs of the microfinance market,

Acknowledging the great potential for Member States to create stronger ties to the private sector, which can lend its managerial and technical expertise to help develop, enhance and support rural businesses,

Emphasizing that an element of competition is necessary to stimulate economic development through innovation and the efficient and effective allocation of resources,

19 Alarmed by the lack of appropriate infrastructure and services in rural areas to allow the proper and sus-20 tainable establishment of businesses,

Further alarmed by the increasing effects that desertification and deforestation have on small rural businesses and agriculture,

1. *Recommends* that Member States conduct national entrepreneurship competitions that empower rural entrepreneurs in taking a leading role in their own business development processes;

- 25 2. Advises that national entrepreneurship competitions should:
- 26

(a) Provide incentive to the winner, the type and extent of incentive being decided by each Member

- 27 State;
- 28

(b) Provide rural entrepreneurs with technical assistance and training to develop their business;

(c) Involve the participation of the private sector by having distinguished businesses in their respec tive industries mentor rural entrepreneurs;

(d) Extend incentive programs to private businesses such as monetary incentives, tax incentives or
contract awards to encourage their participation in rural entrepreneurship programs;

33 3. Affirms that these competitions should be designed by the respective Member States in which they are 34 held;

4. *Invites* Member States to improve the availability and accessibility of business and market information through increased infrastructure for the internet; 5. *Calls upon* Member States to promote the participation, investment, construction and management of private entities in infrastructure in the hopes of balancing the private sector's management and technical skills with that of the public sector to provide essential services more efficiently and effectively;

6. *Requests* that Member States provide a platform to incorporate rural entrepreneurs and farmers into the local production chain in order to:

- 42 (a) Ensure rural entrepreneurs and farmers a more stable market presence;
- (b) Encourage improvements in the quality of the goods and services produced by rural entrepreneursand farmers;

45 7. *Supports* public-private partnerships to create more opportunities for micro-financing, which would en-46 courage rural development by:

47 48 loan; (a) Requiring micro-entrepreneurs and farmers to engage in savings in order to obtain a microfinance

- 49 (b) Allow for more favorable loan rates;
- 50 (c) Empower women to play a larger role in local economies;
- 51 (d) Reduce the amount of red-tape required to obtain loans;

52 8. *Suggests* that benefits such as subsidies, tax benefits and microfinance loans be offered to farmers to 53 encourage sustainable farming practices, which would help reduce short and long-term costs for the farmers, such as 54 but not limited to:

- 55 (a) Water conservation;
- 56 (b) Crop rotation;
- 57 (c) Soil enrichment;

9. *Encourages* Member States to reduce regulatory obstacles for farmers to obtain permits and licenses to farm and trade agricultural products;

60 10. *Further encourages* private sectors to clean up and build water sources in areas that have limited access 61 to clean water;

62 11. *Invites* Member States to discourage unsustainable environmental behavior that constitutes the trans-63 portation of water from areas in danger of the effects of desertification.
