SUBJECT OF RESOLUTION: National legislation on transfer of arms, military equipment and

dual-use goods and technology

SUBMITTED TO: The General Assembly First Committee

The General Assembly First Committee,

- 1 Recognizing the importance of efficiently regulating weapons and dual-use goods trade,
- 2 Understanding the relationship between weapons trade, for both national and international economies,
- 3 Further recognizing the importance of maintaining sovereignty between Member States,
- Noting the continued necessity for international legislation concerning trade of dual-use goods and technologies,
 - Acknowledging the various successes and failures of previous United Nations General Assembly resolutions in coordinating and implementing arms trade legislation and regulation,
 - Recognizing the effectiveness of previously passed legislation, particularly the establishment of an online database in resolution 57/66 of 22 November 2002 by the Secretariat's Office for Disamament Affairs,
- 10 Affirming the rights of all Member States to individual and/or collective self-defense as well as to enforce 11 sovereign domestic law,
- 12 1. Affirms the General Assembly's continuing support for existing international legislation concerning trade 13 in dual-use goods and technologies, particularly Security Council Resolution 1540 of 28 April 2004:
 - 2. Recommends that Member States with the capacity to do so, submit information to the Secretary-General on domestic policy regarding dual-use goods production, regulations, and trade, as well direct arms transfer, as outlined under the provisions of resolution 68/44 of 5 December 2013;
 - 3. Recommends the creation of a United Nations subcommittee in conjunction with the United Nations Office for Disarmament Affairs to monitor and report on intergovernmental relations regarding the arms trade and dual weapon usage between Member States:
 - (a) Authorizes the continued involvement of this subcommittee to observe and report the progress of Member States in their involvement with these clauses;
 - (b) Additionally this body is required to meet on a biweekly basis to advise and report on the aforementioned clauses;
- (c) Advises this subcommittee to give special focus to Member States in the form of acting as voluntary observers who report back to this committee, by which ensure the transparency of weapons and dual-use goods trade between and within Member States;
 - 4. Reaffirms the definition of small arms to include "any man-portable lethal weapon designed for individual use that expels or launches, is designed to expel or launch, or may be readily converted to expel or launch a shot, bullet or projectile by the action of an explosive," as defined by the latest iteration International Small Arms Control Standard (ISACS) of 2016;
 - 5. Encourages Member States to engage in the use of alternative development methods to engender other means of income separate from weapons and dual-use goods trade;
- 6. *Emphasizes* the importance of communication between Member States to discourage the illegal trade of arms and dual-use technologies that have the potential to be used as tools for nefarious purposes, as well as recommends the continued development of intergovernmental communication.
