SUBJECT OF RESOLUTION: Industrial development cooperation

SUBMITTED TO: The General Assembly Second Committee

The General Assembly Second Committee,

Reaffirming sovereignty as the guiding principle of the international community,

Recognizing the continuing depletion of natural resources and how that negatively affects industrial development in the developing world,

Underscoring the utility of regional entities in coordinating multilateral efforts to further the welfare and development of states,

Supporting the valuable work of the United Nations Industrial Development Organization (UNIDO),

Deeply concerned for the development of an exploitative dynamic between resource-endowed developing Member States, being labor rich and capital shallow, and those nations ormultinational firms for which the reverse is true,

Guided by goals articulated by different keystone UN documents and resolutions, such as Resolution 2152 of 17 November 1966,

Affirms the key objectives outlined in the Sustainable Development Goals: dealing with infrastructure, sustainable growth, renewable energy, availability of food and clean waterand other humanitarian centric goals,

- 1. Suggests the facilitationgreater transfer of technology between developed nations and developing nations:
- 15 (a) Bringing developing Member States to the international community on a more equal footing 16 with developed Member States;
  - (b) Proposed oversight by UN Office Of The High Representative For The Least Developed Countries, Landlocked Developing Countries And Small Island Developing States (UN-OHRLLS);
    - (c) Achieved through the release of additional funds;
- 20 2. Calls upon various other United Nations bodies to expand the aforementioned technology sharing programs to increase the viability and ultimate success of the technology sharing programs while:
- (a) Calling for the review of these programs on an annual basis, conducted by the IDB within the UNIDO, to determine their future efficacy and viability;
  - 3. Urges the mainstreaming of consideration by the United Nations to embolden developing Member Statesin addressing extractive development dynamics that push states off of their sustainable trajectories:
- 26 (a) Expansion of efforts would be achieved through mediation of trade negotiations between devel-27 oping and developed Member States by Lawyers Without Borders;
  - 4. *Invites* freeand expanded cooperation on regional basis among states of similar developmental status, in concert with regional bodies and financial institutions, whose grasp of regional economic landscapes better equips them to foster holistic regional development;
  - 5. Recommends international development organizations to work with Member States and pertinent United Nations bodies to diversify their economies to better weather financial aid and political troubles with proposed funding at the discretion of:
- 34 (a) The International Bank for Reconstruction and Development under the advisement of the World 35 Bank;

- 36 (b) The United Nations General Assembly under the advisement of the United Nations Industrial 37 Development Organization (UNIDO);
- 38 (c) Alternative ways to achieve economic diversity would be through accepting investments from 39 various non-state private institutions and dispersing risk through several industries, therefore avoiding creation of a 40 rentier state.
