SUBJECT OF RESOLUTION: Antimicrobial resistance

SUBMITTED TO: The General Council of the Food and Agriculture Organization

The General Council of the Food and Agriculture Organization,

Recognizing the increased prevalence of antimicrobial resistance (AMR) across the globe, especially with regards to agricultural use,

Deeply concerned by the detrimental effects of widespread AMR,

Noting that improper and increased use of antibiotics for both preventative and curative practices has led to the escalation of AMR,

Further noting that a lack of education has perpetuated the excessive use of antibiotics, especially in an agricultural context,

- 8 1. Reminds Member States that there is a critical difference in purpose and outcome between preventatively feeding livestock with antibiotics and curatively treating livestock with antibiotics;
 - 2. Strongly affirms the World Health Organization's (WHO) Global Action Plan on Antimicrobial Resistance, particularly in its reference to recommending the restriction of low-level, non-theraputic administration antimicrobials in the livestock industry;
- 3. Encourages Member States to increase education and awareness among both the public and farmers by government-funded programs and non-governmental organizations regarding the following:
 - (a) AMR and the overuse of antibiotics;
 - (b) The nature of AMR in animals, particularly livestock;
 - (c) The nature of AMR in crops and seeds;
 - 4. Urges Member States to promote a higher quality of animal welfare and the use of antibiotics for preventing diseases as opposed to the current culture of using antibiotics for preemptive treatment of disease;
- 5. Requests that Member States review their prohibition on the use antibiotics without prescription so as to preclude farmers' ability to use them for preemptive and non-theraputic purposes;
- 6. Supports further educating veterinarians regarding the dangers of overprescription of antibiotics to livestock in both a preventative and curative context;
- 7. Urges Member States to implement programs that use veterinary medicine and guided regulations to ensure appropriate use of antibiotics in agriculture in both a preventative and curative context;
- 8. Recommends that Member States implement regular surveys on the knowledge, attitudes and practices regarding AMR;
- 9. Strongly encourages Member States to participate in the protocols set out by the Global Antimicrobial Resistance Surveillance System (GLASS) in order to combat AMR.
