

## American Model United Nations Historical Security Council – 1994

SUBJECT OF RESOLUTION: Situation in Bosnia and Herzegovina

SUBMITTED TO: The Historical Security Council – 1994

The Historical Security Council – 1994,

1 *Deeply concerned* by the absence of progress towards peace in the Vance-Owen peace process outlined in the 2 London International Conference,

*Alarmed by* the failure of humanitarian aide to reach at-risk populations in Sarajevo and the greater Bosnia-Herzegovina area,

5 *Regrets* the violations and breaches of agreed upon ceasefire agreements that propagates the conflict,

6 *Resolves* that a renewed emphasis on peace negotiations is the sustainable approach to a long-term solution 7 in Bosnia-Herzegovina,

8 1. *Encourages* the installment of peace negotiations in Paris, France including Bosnia-Herzegovina, Croatia, 9 Yugoslavia, Russia, Pakistan, France, a representative of the Non-Alligned Movement, and a representative of the 10 Secretary General beginning on 15 March 1994;

11 2. *Invites* any other concerned parties to be observers to this discussion;

3. *Demands* a ceasefire throughout the duration of peace negotiations in Paris so that Member States can air-lift a 90-day supply of food, water, clothing, and blankets to help create stability in Sarajevo:

(a) The United States of America will provide helicopters to send supplies directly to the city ofSarajevo;

(b) The Sultanate of Oman, France, and the United Kingdom pledge to contribute to the financingof the airlift;

(c) Peacekeepers provided in clause four (4) would be responsible for the distribution of supplies;

4. Urges Member States to contribute additional peacekeepers and peacekeeping capabilities to maintain the ceasefire in Bosnia-Herzegovina and the safety of all parties involved in peace negotiations;

5. *Requires* the Office of the Secretary-General of the United Nations to publish a report on the actions taken by all parties involved with the Bosnia-Herzegovina conflict by 1 March 1994, to gain a clearer understanding of the situation on the ground before entering peace talks.
