SUBJECT OF RESOLUTION: Safety and security of humanitarian personnel and protection of

United Nations personnel

SUBMITTED TO: The General Assembly Plenary (Concurrent)

The General Assembly Plenary (Concurrent),

1 Recognizing the dangers that United Nations peacekeepers and humanitarian personnel face on every mission,

2 Expressing gratitude for the bravery of peacekeeping forces and humanitarian personnel and those who have 3 lost their lives in United Nations peacekeeping missions,

Recalling for the body that the purpose of peacekeeping operations is to de-escalate conflict,

Noting with concern the outdated technology and lack thereof for peacekeepers,

Understanding that the security of peacekeepers and humanitarian workers are not only contingent on the updating of technology,

Concerned with the advancement and proliferation of offensive technology by non-state armed groups,

Noting with concern the 2017 Report on Improving Security of United Nations Peacekeepers, which emphasizes the need for basic modern technology to maintain each peacekeeper's edge over harmful actors,

Acknowledging Security Council Resolution 2378 (2017) of 20 September 2017, which notes the need for updated technology and aviation assets,

- 1. Recommends the use of unarmed drone technology to increase peacekeeping security by:
  - (a) Improving the ability to carry small supplies in areas with low infrastructure;
  - (b) Providing vital data to peacekeepers in conflict and disaster zones;
  - (c) Improving communication abilities of peacekeepers;
  - (d) Improving reconnaissance and intelligence technology;
- 2. Further requests the contribution of modern military technology from Member States, including but not limited to:
  - (a) Night vision goggles, body armor, medicine, modern unarmed vehicles, motion sensor cameras, flood lights, and other non-offensive reconnaissance technology;
    - 3. Urges the shift from traditional to smart peacekeeping efforts as recommended by the Security Council;
    - 4. Encourages Member States to increase funding for peacekeeping mandates to afford this new technology;
    - 5. Encourages peacekeeper-contributing Member States to train their peacekeepers in this newer technology;
- 6. Recommends the sharing of necessary peacekeeping operations intelligence with humanitarian organizations for their protection;
- 7. *Urges* that this new military technology be used judiciously by peacekeeping forces with respect to state sovereignty and protection of civilians.
