## American Model United Nations General Assembly Sixth Committee

SUBJECT OF RESOLUTION: Criminal accountability of United Nations officials and experts on

mission

SUBMITTED TO: The General Assembly Sixth Committee

The General Assembly Sixth Committee,

1 Recognizing the deeply abhorrent nature of sexual abuses of power over civilians that have been committed 2 by employees of the United Nations,

Recalling that, according to the Gender, Conflict and Peacebuilding Report of September 2011, security and peace are often gendered goods,

5 Understanding the political, international and intersectional consequences of sexual crimes against humanity 6 to victims, families and communities,

Acknowledging sexual assault as a gendered crime against humanity,

8 Recalling Section 20 of The Convention on the Privileges and Immunities of the United Nations of 13 February 9 1946.

Respecting with reverence the ability of community members to empathize with one another and create more comfortable situations when discussing sensitive topics,

*Emphasizing* the critical role of accurate and secure confidential data acquisition, transcription and communication in reporting sexual abuses of power to the United Nations,

Reminding the body of the existing Standards of Conduct of Peacekeepers and the assorted training they are already required to undergo pre-deployment,

Recognizing that the Integrated Training Service (ITS) is responsible for the training and evaluation of Peacekeepers internationally,

- 1. Urges the creation of additional reporting networks alongside the Peacekeeping to catch possible offenders before their actions multiply and become endemic to communities;
- 2. Urges for the creation of an Initial Point Reporter (IPR) network, alongside Peacekeeping missions to catch possible offenders before their actions multiply and become endemic to local communities, to be staffed by officially vetted local individuals of high standing and of safe station to provide an approachable and confidential reporting experience by:
- (a) linking victims with local resources on a case by case basis to educate them on their legal rights in sexual assault cases;
- 26 (b) Disseminating a United Nations Document Explaining the Rights of Sexually Abused Persons 27 to legal action;
- 28 (c) Requiring that details of their communications with victims be as confidential and subject to 29 non-disclosure as possible unless the victim wishes to report their case to the United Nations;
- 30 3. Requests that the Secretary General consider removing the privilege of Diplomatic Immunity in cases of sexual assault accusations, as sexual assault is a gendered crime of power against humanity;
  - 4. *Encourages* a group of well vetted officials to accompany all United Nations missions, with the exact number of officials to be reasonable to the size and scope of the mission, in order to compile monthly, and if necessary, weekly reports from the Initial Point Reporters (IPR) that update all necessary officials any on problems to:
    - (a) Report any crime of a serious manner to the appropriate United Nations body;

- (b) Inform all personnel, and nearby civilians of their rights, such as previously mentioned recommended United Nations Document Explaining the Rights of Sexually Abused Persons;
  - (c) Inform personnel and civilians of the resources available for reporting abuse and criminal conduct;
- 5. Encourages for the cooperation of the Partnership for Technology in Peacekeeping to Peacekeeping missions to:
- 42 (a) Provide technological expertise and analysis on a region specific basis such that new technological 43 projects can be prioritized and funding can be allocated for technology based on need in situations specific to 44 peacekeeping;
- (b) Disseminate new information to state representatives about best practices in implementing technology into their legal systems and evidence gathering mechanisms;
- 47 (c) Keep the appropriate body up-to-date regarding the use of encrypted communications and secure 48 cloud information storage technologies in sexual assault reporting and data collection, to preserve confidentiality and 49 security of victim information to the best of the powers of this body.
