SUBJECT OF RESOLUTION: Protection of the environment in areas affected by armed conflict

SUBMITTED TO: The United Nations Environment Assembly

The United Nations Environment Assembly,

1 *Recognizes* that the environment is intrinsically linked to human populations and seeks to mitigate the 2 destruction of the environment,

3 Alarmed by the destruction wrought by armed conflicts resulting in the degradation of the environment,

4 *Recognizing* that the effects of climate change are the causes of armed conflict within Member States and 5 must be attended to,

6 Affirming the agreements set forth in the United Nations Environment Assembly resolution 2/15 August 3 7 2016, titled Protection of the Environment in Areas Affected by Armed Conflict,

8 *Observing* the efforts and accomplishments already achieved by members of the international community 9 concerning the protection of the environment in areas affected by armed conflict,

10 Deeply concerned with the mass relocation of peoples due to environmental damage during conflict,

Emphasizing the need for the aid given by the International Law Commission and the United Nations body in an effort to lessen environmental damage brought about by armed conflict in the Member States with the most need,

14 Believing that a multilateral agenda is necessary to first mitigate and, eventually terminate destructive 15 armed conflicts that adversely affect the environment,

16 Bearing in mind that Member States are not responsible for the internal actions of criminal elements and 17 other violent non-state actors within their boarders,

18 1. *Requests* international support in the prevention of non-state actors damaging the environment further;

2. *Smiles upon* the ongoing preformed by the apparatuses of the United Nations, such as the United Nations First Committee, the Security Council as well as other Member States, to assist in the fomenting of peace and security;

3. *Expresses* its hope that the members of the international community will seek to uphold the tenets outlined within the resolution 2/15 August 3 2016, titled Progress in the implementation of resolution 2/15 August 24 3 2016 on the protection of the environment in areas affected by armed conflict;

4. Acknowledges that oceanic and fresh bodies of water are affected by the degradation of land due to climate change and in response to armed conflict:

(a) Recommending that the United Nations extends its research and monitoring measures to focus
 primarily on areas affected by armed conflict;

5. *Expresses* its hope that the other Member States concentrate on the development of an international instrument aimed towards the control and effective management of key natural resources in areas affected by armed conflict:

(a) Suggesting that the United Nations Environmental Program extends and enhances the program
 known as The Environmental Peace-building Knowledge Platform in order to further educate the Member States on
 the process of rebuilding their environment and natural resources post- conflict;

(b) Further Invites Member States to expand the Great Green Wall launched by the African Union
 to additional regions affected by land degradation and desertification;

- 6. *Proposes* the further endorsement of the Military Waste Cleanup Project created by the United Nations Environment Assembly resolution 3/1 June 27 2014:
- (a) Proposing the further endorsement of the Military Waste Cleanup Project created by the United
 Nations Environment Assembly resolution 3/1;
- 41 (i) The organization will educate, support and dispose of the waste that is produced in the unfortu-42 nate events of armed conflicts in order restore environmental integrity;
- 43 7. *Recommends* that the United Nations Development Program (UNDP) points its efforts toward the 44 rebuilding of communities damaged in areas affected by armed conflict:
- (a) Invites the Economic and Social Council Committee for Program and Coordination and World
 Bank to assist in the funding of sustainable reconstruction projects to rebuild destroyed infrastructure in areas of
 armed conflict.
