(b) That the ICCP would allow the international community to foster relations in order to promote the rights of children, aid in humanitarian issues, and attempt to increase international relations on a more personal scale;

(c) The program would be 100% voluntary, and there are strict guidelines in place to prevent corrupt
neocolonialist policies and abuses of power. These would include limiting legislative power, economic control, and
social influence;

(d) That countries would exchange ideas, with countries being paired based on a sliding scale, in which Country A is lacking in a certain issue, but GDP rich, and vice versa.
