## American Model United Nations Historical Security Council – 2003

The Situation in Afghanistan

SUBMITTED TO: The Historical Security Council - 2003 The Historical Security Council – 2003, Deeply concerned with recent acts of terrorism in Afghanistan and the surrounding regions, 1  $\mathbf{2}$ Reaffirming the previous resolutions of the Security Council on the matter, especially Resolution 1314 (2002) and Resolution 1386 (2001), 3 Bearing in mind the Counter-Terrorism Committee, created by Resolution 1373 (2001), which assists the 4 United Nations in counter-terrorism measures, 5Recognizing the Office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights' definition of terrorism as 6 being "commonly understood to refer to acts of violence that target civilians in the pursuit of political or ideological 7 aims", 8 *Recalling* the commitments of the international community with regard to the International Convention for 9 the Suppression of Terrorism Bombings (1997) and the International Convention for the Suppression of the Financing 10 of Terrorism (1999), 11 Respecting and committed to the respect of sovereignty, independence and territorial integrity of each Member 12State, 131. Strongly condemns the acts of terrorist groups in threatening the peace and security of Member States 14and the international community and peoples that comprise those nations, including, but not limited to the following 15events: 16 (a) The attack on the United Nations convoy in Afghanistan that killed two Afghan security officers, 17as reported on 27 January 2003; 18 (b) The battle between American forces and terrorist insurgents during which American forces seized 19weapons and bomb-making materials, as reported on 27 January 2003; 20(c) The bombing of a bridge in Kandahar, Afghanistan which killed 18 people, as reported on 4 21 February 2003; 22(d) The ambush on American forces by terrorist insurgents, where 17 civilians were killed by the 23insurgents, as reported 16 February 2003; 242. Designates the United Nations Counter-Terrorism Committee to review accusations of terrorism sponsored 25by state actors and provide the Security Council with annual reports detailing any factual claims of state-sponsored 26terrorism and interim reports as needed; 273. Declares accordingly that any state that is found by the United Nations Counter-Terrorism Committee 28to be sponsoring terrorists will face the possibility of sanctions and other consequences that are deemed appropriate 2930 by the Security Council: 4. Continues the support of ongoing missions in the region such as the International Security Assistance 31Force as envisioned in the Bonn Agreement; 325.
