SUBJECT OF RESOLUTION: The Situation in Israel and Palestine

SUBMITTED TO: The Historical Security Council – 2003

The Historical Security Council - 2003,

Recognizing the extended history of the conflict between the Member State of Israel and the Observer State of Palestine,

3 Further recognizing that the tensions and the humanitarian crisis between the Member State of Israel and 4 the Observer State of Palestine continue to escalate,

5 Recalling all its previous relevant resolutions, in particular Resolution 242 (1967), Resolution 338 (1973) and 6 Resolution 1397 (2002),

7 Acknowledging the expressed desire of the Madrid Quartet for the coexistence of the Member State of Israel 8 and the Observer State of Palestine,

Expressing concern for the safety of those in the West Bank and in the Gaza Strip from Israeli forces, as well as the Israeli people along the aforementioned borders,

Strongly disturbed by the casualties of civilians, refugees, children and health workers,

- 1. Calls for the immediate ceasefire of all conflict between the Israeli and Palestinian territories;
- 2. Requests the gradual withdrawal of both Israeli forces and Palestinian forces to conflict-neutral zones;
- 3. Requests further that a United Nations Peacekeeping operation of 2,000 personnel, contributed by Member States, be located throughout the region to maintain peaceful relations until recalled by the United Nations Security Council;
- 4. *Implores* the United Nations Security Council to dispatch a delegation to begin the facilitation of peace talks between the Member State of Israel and the Observer State of Palestine;
- 5. Encourages that both the Member State of Israel and the Observer State of Palestine do all in their power to halt and extinguish the efforts of state and non-state sponsored terrorist organizations;
- 6. Suggests that the leaders of both the Member State of Israel and the Observer State of Palestine begin conversations of peace in order to allow every individual of the Israel-Palestine region to peacefully coexist;
- 7. Further suggests that the Israeli people and the Palestinian people cooperate in peace talks to attempt to understand one another's culture in order to create a more stable and prosperous region for all;
- 8. Notes that the United Nations does not want to infringe on the state sovereignty of the Member State of Israel;
- 9. Decides to remain seized of the matter.
