SUBJECT OF RESOLUTION: The Situation in Latin America

## The Security Council,

1 *Recalling* previous Security Council discussions and reports provided by United Nations bodies concerning 2 the situation in Latin America,

*Noting* with concern the current severe humanitarian crises in South America that are resulting in an untenable quality of life for many South Americans,

*Emphasizing* the need for all parties to uphold and respect the humanitarian principles of humanity, neutrality, impartiality and independence in order to ensure the continued provision of humanitarian assistance, the safety of civilians receiving assistance and the security of humanitarian personnel operating in South America,

8 Stressing the importance of humanitarian assistance being delivered on the basis of need,

9 Understanding that these crises spawn from broader political and economic situations of great complexity,

10 *Conscious* of the principles of the Declaration of Human Rights which every state should strive to achieve,

11 Acknowledging that further understanding of the situations and intelligence is necessary before pragmatic 12 solutions to these situations can be found,

13 Noting with interest the lack of a United Nations Mission in South America,

14 *Emphasizing* the need of relief for the peoples of South America to prevent further catastrophes,

15 *Recognizing* that in order to achieve broad economic and political change the basic needs and of the peoples 16 of South America must be addressed,

17 *Further emphasizing* the ability of United Nations Missions to provide direct humanitarian aid without 18 political interference and to operate as a fact-finding body,

19 1. Determines that the situation in South America constitutes a threat to international peace and security;

20 2. Acts under Chapter VII of the Charter of the United Nations;

3. *Establishes* the United Nations Mission in South America (UNMSA) with its base of operations being set in Monterideo, Uruguay and area of operations across all South America;

4. *Invites* the Secretary-General to appoint the Head of Mission along with other key leaders;

5. *Requests* that the Economic Commission for Latin America and the Carribean (ECLAC) work closely with UNMSA to support the region;

6. *States* that the Head of Mission will work with United Nations Peace Operations to maximize the mission's capacity;

7. *Determines* that the UNMSA will operate until December 1, 2024 followed by a reassessment of the economic, humanitarian, and political situation by the Security Council to determine if its mandate should be renewed;

8. *Decides* that the mandate of UNMSA shall be as follows and authorizes the UNMSA to use all necessary means to perform the following tasks:

(a) Work to increase the quality of life and pursue the principles outlined in the Declaration of
Human Rights in all South American States, regardless of political status or recognization. If a country chooses to
reject UNMSA aid, they can accept at a later time;

(c) Strive alongside the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees to provide relief and support 38 39 to refugees and internally displaced persons as well as alleviate the burden placed on the countries that have taken in these persons; 40(d) Empower the World Food Programme to reach their maximum operational capacity in the region; 41 (e) Utilize an initial force of 10,000 United Nations Peacekeepers to protect aid workers and ensure 42that aid reaches the intended recipients; 43(f) Have jurisdiction over and provide coordination with Non-Governmental Organizations (NGOs) 44 and United Nation bodies providing various forms of aid South America not listed above; 459. Further determines that the UNMSA budget will be five hundred million USD annually, derived from 46a mandatory payment apportioned across United Nations Member States, as seen fit by the General Assembly in 47 accordance with Article 17 of the United Nations Charter, and shall include the following apportionments: 48(a) The amount of two hundred million USD will be allocated to the World Food Programme in 49order to alleviate the immediate threat of starvation throughout the region; 50(b) The amount of one hundred million USD will be allocated to initial resources and infrastructure 51for the UNMSA; 52(c) The amount of two hundred million USD will be allocated to humanitarian organizations and 53 operations, including, but not limited to, the UNHCR and water improvement; 54(d) This apportionment is for the first fiscal year of UNMSA's operations and will be revisited by 55the Security Council in one year's time *taking into suggestion* the report of UNMSA on the situation at that time; 5610. Affirms the UNMSA's autonomy in determining and delivering aid within the reigns of respecting state 57sovereignty under the following guidelines: 58(a) The UNMSA reserves the absolute right to decide the recipients of aid based on need, not political 59or social status; 60 (b) UNMSA will coordinate with governments, factions, and powers to facilitate aid, but will not 61 surrender aid to entities for them to deliver themselves; 62(c) Any country that refuses the terms above will not receive UNMSA assistance; 63 11. Further decides that the UNMSA will provide reports to the Security Council on its efforts and the 64ongoing situation in South America including the following mandatory reports: 6566 (a) The Head of Mission will submit an initial report within the first 90 days of the adoption of this resolution summarizing the formation of the mission and any difficulties; 67(b) Every six months the UNMSA will submit a report on efforts undertaken during those six months 68 and future operations; 69 (c) The Security Council may request a special report on a situation or operation at any time; 7012. (b) Task the World Water Quality Alliance with providing relevant evidence-based assessments,
