SUBJECT OF RESOLUTION: Universal realization of the right of peoples to self-

determination

SUBMITTED TO: The General Assembly Third Committee

The General Assembly Third Committee,

Recalling United Nations General Assembly resolution 1514 of 14 December 1960 that emphasized the right to self-determination, in relation to the decolonization of countries and the increased rights of indigenous populations within existing States,

Recognizing that the right of people to self-determination is a fundamental principle of international law, which was recognised by the United Nations in 1948 and enshrined in the Charter of the United Nations,

Understanding that indigenous groups face poverty and unfair treatment due to a lack of control over their own communities,

Regretting that indigenous groups are disproportionately affected by environmental exploits such as mining, logging and oil extraction,

Acknowledging that the realization of self-determination must be pursued in a peaceful manner, without causing interference with the principle of sovereignty and territorial integrity,

Affirming the importance of the right of peoples to self-determination and the hindrance of this right due to increased conflict and occupation in many States around the world,

Concerned by the international lack of legislation supporting self-determination for indigenous groups,

Taking into consideration that some Member States have successfully fostered a positive relationship with their indigenous populations,

- 1. Encourages the creation of a fund to support the programs established in this resolution;
- 2. Supports the creation of an oversight mechanism that includes the direct participation of representatives from non-self-governing territories to ensure transparency, accountability and community-led decision making:
- (a) This mechanism shall be a committee which publishes annual field reports on the condition of indigenous peoples that will then be used to guide funding decisions;
- (b) The committee will be funded by the voluntary specific fund associated with this resolution;
- 3. Requests the United Nations Peacebuilding Fund, United Nations Development Programme and other relevant agencies offer technical assistance to Member States seeking to strengthen indigenous protections or inclusive governance structures;
- 4. Encourages Member States to support United Nations technical assistance programs aimed at supporting indigenous communities in preserving their cultural identities and strengthening local governance and community participation;
- 5. Requests the Office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights and United Nations Development Programme to develop capacity-building workshops on self-administration, legal literacy and institution-building;

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- 6. Supports the role of the United Nations and other international organizations in facilitating mediation and in monitoring peaceful sessions to assist peoples in exercising their rights with appropriate and mutual consent;
- 7. Encourages partnerships between indigenous authorities and States to strengthen autonomy structures to address concerns that unresolved grievances between indigenous populations and States can escalate into separatist pressure, armed conflict or parallel governance structures:
 - (a) Self-determination processes must occur in a manner respectful of territorial integrity and international law;
 - 8. Recommends that Member States recognize indigenous and occupied populations and their rights to self-determination by adopting legislation which offers financial independence to such populations and invites them to engage in international affairs.
