SUBJECT OF RESOLUTION: Promoting The Health of Migrants

SUBMITTED TO: The World Health Organization Executive Board

The World Health Organization Executive Board,

Recognizing the unique healthcare challenges faced by migrant populations across the globe whilst keeping in mind that the this body is not proposing a change in migrant acceptance policies,

3 Acknowledging that the provision of migrants comes at a great cost to receiving Member States and is a 4 laborious task,

Considering the necessity of an unobstructed line of communication between medical institutions, particularly in the form of regular dispatches between hospitals, and the continued discussions between health departments within governments,

8 Taking into consideration the adverse effects of migration on health, which may include serious illness or 9 injury,

Noting that an emergency may be defined as any injury that requires immediate medical care to prevent death or serious injury constitutes an emergency, including mental health issues which must be considered a necessary component of comprehensive health care when dealing with emergency situations,

Recognizing that the job of caring for migrants is not a duty relegated only to Member States accepting but to countries of origin,

- 1. Distinguishes between the various causes which impels one to urgently flee their home as:
 - (a) Ecological motives, such as famines, droughts, flooding, etc;
 - (b) Confrontational motives, such as war, persecution, instability, etc.;
- 2. Designates two types of necessary care based on an individual's motives for migration, namely:
- 19 (a) "Emergency care," which is designated for migrants who migrate due to ecological and con-20 frontational motives;
- (b) "Preventative care," which is designated for migrants who migrate for all other reasons, including (but not limited to) political, economic and healthcare reasons;
- 3. Endorses the creation of specific, measurable goals for expanding capacity of existing healthcare infrastructure and improving the equitability of outcomes for migrant populations;
- 4. Calls on Member States to create accessible pathways through which migrants may obtain health insurance through existing programs for both emergency and preventative care;
- 5. Calls for the expansion of assessment and treatment options in terms of specific health conditions that migrants may face;
- 6. Calls on Member States to facilitate discussion between hospitals, medical institutions and departments so as to further disseminate common information to the benefit of the people.
