	The World Health Organization Executive Board,
1	Acknowledging the importance of vaccination, regardless of geographic location,
$\frac{2}{3}$	<i>Recognizing</i> the delicacy of conflict situations and emphasizing the importance of respecting Member States' sovereignty,
4	Deeply concerned with the lower rates of vaccinations in areas of conflict,
5	Further recognizing the role of natural disasters in preventing vaccine access,
6	Emphasizing the possibility that disease could further endanger populations living in conflict-ridden regions,
7	Further acknowledging that populations in conflict zones are particularly vulnerable to disease outbreak,
8 9	1. <i>Resolves</i> to increase support for immunization efforts in zones facing lowered vaccination rates as a result of conflicts or infrastructural instability;
10 11 12	2. <i>Calls</i> for collaborative efforts of businesses, non-governmental organizations (NGOs), governments and international organizations to pool available material and financial resources for the further improvement of vaccination distribution efforts, and as such:
13 14 15	(a) <i>Encourages</i> collaboration with local health care providers, NGOs and international organizations such as (but not limited to) Red Cross, Save the Children, PLAN International, and United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF);
16 17	(b) <i>Calls</i> for the establishment of several independent, regional Immunization Task Forces (ITFs) to coordinate distribution efforts and use of resources, depending on the needs of the area;
18 19	(c) Strongly suggests that such ITFs should be independent and have no stake within conflict, other than providing immunizations;
20	3. <i>Recommends</i> further research regarding improvement of vaccines with the goals of:
21	(a) Eliminating the need for vaccine refrigeration;
22	(b) Decreasing the number and/or size of each dose;
23 24	(c) Removing needles as a means of administration while researching other methods of administration such as nasal or oral administration.
