SUBJECT OF RESOLUTION: Youth, disarmament and non-proliferation

SUBMITTED TO: The General Assembly First Committee

The General Assembly First Committee,

Recalling its resolution General Assembly A/RES/75/45 on Youth, Disarmament and Nonproliferation, which emphasized the crucial role of youth in fostering a culture of peace and security,

Acknowledging the importance of disarmament and nonproliferation efforts in maintaining international 3 peace and security, 4

Recognizing the potential of youth as agents of change and contributors to global efforts in promoting disarmament and preventing the proliferation of weapons,

Acknowledging the significance of previous international agreements and resolutions on disarmament and non-proliferation including Youth, Disarmament and Nonproliferation biennial resolution (2019 & 2021), Biological Weapons Convention (BWC), Chemical Weapons Convention (CWC),

Affirming the need for a comprehensive approach that integrates gender perspectives and contributions of 10 youth in disarmament and nonproliferation initiatives, 11

Recalling its commitment to the ideals of the Charter of the United Nations and the crucial role of youth in achieving and maintaining international peace and security,

Recognizing the continued challenges posed by the proliferation of conventional and unconventional weapons and the importance of disarmament efforts in addressing these challenges, 15

Acknowledging the need for a multilateral approach that actively includes the perspectives and contributions of youth in the formulation and implementation of disarmament and nonproliferation policies,

- 1. Providing healthcare to affected regions through mobile-clinic programs leading to increased access to 18 reproductive health services; 19
- 2. Recommending that the Security Council to strengthen monitoring and prevention of sexual violence in 20 conflict as stated in Resolution 2106 [2013]; 21
- 3. Calling on Member States to increase participation of women in discussions on the preventions and 22 resolutions of youth and disarmament; 23
 - 4. Calls for funding on a voluntary basis for furthering education programs, and greater training for teachers;
- 25 5. Calls for support to enhance current education systems through the creation of better engaging lessons through initiatives such as Leaders to the Future by United Nations Office of Disarmament affairs; 26
- 6. Actively tackle corruption within schools through the inspection of educational administrators through 27 initiatives: 28
- 29 7. Developing online platforms and networks to facilitate global collaboration among youth organizations working on disarmament and nonproliferation efforts, fostering the exchange of ideas and best practices; 30
- 8. Coordinating with international nonprofit organizations to engage with youth populations especially in 31 regions of prevalent violent extremism, including the Middle East and Sub-Saharan Africa; 32
- 9. Encourages member states to support research, development, and innovation contests among young 33 34 scientists and researchers, with a focus on developing solutions related to the challenge of disarmament and nonproliferation; 35
