SUBJECT OF RESOLUTION: The safety of journalists and the issue of impunity

SUBMITTED TO: The General Assembly Third Committee

The General Assembly Third Committee,

Acknowledging the primary responsibility under the Charter of the United Nations for the preservation of international peace and security,

Noting with appreciation the 2030 Sustainable Development Agenda, particularly sustainable development goal 16.10 peace, justice and strong institutions in regard to public access to information,

Guided by the principles set forth in Article 7 of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, specifically regarding its non-discrimination clauses,

Recalling with appreciation resolutions 21/12 of 9 October 2012, 68/163 of 21 February 2014 and 45/18 of 6 October 2020, concerning the safety of journalists and the effects of the spread of information,

Recognizing the need for protection of journalists who identify as women in order to further social justice and peace,

Reaffirming the principles of Member States' sovereignty, especially in regard to Member State institutions dealing with the unlawful spread of misinformation and propaganda to protect national security,

Reminding Member States that the laws enacted to protect nations from media breaches of national security must be abided by both citizens and non-citizens of the specific Member State in which any transgression may take place,

Taking into account the international presence of journalistic bodies, it is necessary to facilitate sweeping transnational cooperation to ensure the global protection of journalists,

Encouraging all Member States to support the truth and accuracy of the media and to maintain a proactive relationship with media outlets within their purview,

Alarmed by misinformation, disinformation and malinformation - the spread of false statements with malicious intent as defined by the United Nations - which can be propagated by malicious actors to spread discord and social unrest,

- 23 1. Supports the continued strengthening of existing institutional frameworks within Member States that 24 address cases of disinformation within their borders;
- 25 2. Encourages Member States to allocate resources towards bodies that work to promote the verifiable accuracy of media sources;
- 3. Advocates for Member States to protect the journalistic profession from those who seek to spread harmful and dangerous misinformation;
 - 4. Strongly encourages Member States to facilitate training on best practices for journalists, aided by the Office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights (OHCHR) should a Member State request their assistance, in an effort to:
 - (a) Encourage journalists to act within the boundaries of applicable Member State laws;
- 33 (b) Train journalists on how to most safely operate within areas of potential conflict or areas of 34 greater risk to personal safety;
- 35 (c) Encouraging an emphasis on implementing educational tactics on how to keep female journalists, 36 in particular, safe for the duration of their reporting;

- 37 (d) Have journalists collaborate with relevant international and national media agencies to ensure 38 only reliable and accurate information is disseminated to the people;
- 39 (e) Reduce the proliferation of misinformation, disinformation and malinformation through discour-40 aging unverified reporting;
- 5. *Implores* Member States to take tangible measures to encourage the safety of their journalists, and to swiftly address the issues of impunity regarding their journalistic institutions.
